From the Deputy Principals

Year 11 Preliminary Examinations

As parents of Year 11 students know, the Preliminary (Year 11) course is drawing to a close and the last two weeks of this term (Weeks 9 and 10) will see our final assessments take place before students move into the HSC course at the start of Term 4. These final assessment tasks take the form of end of course examinations. Teachers will provide assessment notifications at least two weeks prior which will detail the general structure of the examination and topics to be assessed. The best advice we can give our students however, is not to wait for this notification as the indicator that it is now time to start studying. Instead, a measured and careful approach starting right now is crucial if students are going to perform at their best. At the end of Term 2, at the point of Year 11 Semester 1 reports being distributed, Ms Roberts and I met with a large group of our most hardworking, yet in many cases, unsung success stories amongst the Year 11 student cohort. We were privileged to be able to chat to these students and present them with merit awards for their efforts. Student recipients were not necessarily the first place recipients of their classes, but rather, the awards were presented to students who try their best and often go unnoticed. In all our interviews with these students, when we asked what the secret to their success was, they largely told us the same thing: that their success was based on starting their preparations early, not leaving things until the last minute

and taking on board the advice of their teachers. I therefore implore our entire student body to take heed of this fantastic advice from their own classmates.

Staff Professional Learning

Our teaching staff at Elderslie High School has spent many hours during Term 2 engaged in highly effective professional learning. We spent two after school sessions during Term 2 engaged in examining contemporary learning practices that promoted faculty and individual teacher reflection about our practices. We were delighted to hear from Associate Professor Judy Anderson from the University of Sydney who presented a keynote address about STEM education in schools. Judy is the Director of the University of Sydney's STEM Teacher Enrichment Academy and gave our staff some great insight into implementation approaches of these new pedagogies within schools. We then followed this up with workshops on creative thinking, teaching collaboration and communication, and heard reports from the inaugural coding and STEM class units being undertaken during 2017.

At our most recent School Development Day on Monday, 17 July, we spent significant time beginning to develop our new school plan for the next three years. Our staff also began explicit professional learning around management of students with behavioural needs. This professional learning highlights our staff's commitment on an ongoing basis to reflecting on their practice and sharing what works best.

Parents and Citizens Association Success

We would like to pass on a huge thank you to our amazing P&C Association for their tireless work in support of our school. The P&C is a small but committed group of parents who recently raised over \$1600 at our Bunnings barbecue on Sunday, June 18. Our next fundraising barbecue will take place at school on Friday evening, September 8 for Dance Spectacular but if parents are unable to help out at that time, there are many other ways you can lend a hand. You may be able to donate a box of soft drink cans which can be dropped off to the school at any time. Alternately, you may be a local butcher or bakery owner who can donate sausages or bread rolls. In any case, funds raised are passed on to the school to directly benefit our students.

Our P&C meetings are held in the school library on Tuesday evenings at 7pm in Weeks 3 and 7 each term and we are always looking for more parents to join us. Our meetings feature a faculty presentation on each occasion that gives parents direct insight into what happens in Elderslie High School classrooms and what better way to find out what is happening at school than to come along?

Concerning Television Programs

Many parents may be aware of several television programs aired on Netflix recently that may present confronting

themes. "13 Reasons Why" and "To the Bone" contain graphic imagery and content such as adolescent suicide and eating disorders. Expert bodies such as the Butterfly Foundation and Headspace have raised concerns about these shows and have launched information about how parents might respond to them. NAIDOC Week

On Thursday 29 June Elderslie High School celebrated NAIDOC week by holding an assembly and a community lunch. The theme of NAIDOC week 2017 was 'taking the next steps' and a major focus of the assembly was about the preservation of Aboriginal language. There was a larger number of Aboriginal students involved in the assembly this year, which was due to the work of Mrs Jeffries our Aboriginal Education Coordinator. Mr Jayson Neill, a representative from the Department of Education, was invited to speak at the assembly, our choir sang the indigenous version of the National Anthem, our senior students explained the significance of fire, water and earth and two of our Year 8 girls Abby Lenard and Samantha Rouland performed speeches they wrote for the Speak Up competition. Other students developed a presentation, which explained the significance of NAIDOC week in Australia. The assembly concluded with Mrs Fawcett who presented the ZONTA Leadership Award to Georgia Eggert who was selected from all the applicants from NSW and ACT for this prestigious award.



The parents, staff and students who attended the assembly were also invited to our community lunch which allowed for casual conversation to celebrate our student achievements and to further develop and improve relationships with our parent community. Many of our students attended the morning tea and enjoyed celebrating Aboriginal community, culture and language.

Uniform

Students were informed at a whole school assembly in Term 2 to wear the correct school uniform. Many boys have been wearing grey and khaki pants with elasticised ankles, which **are not** school uniform and should not be worn to school. Maths Gifted and Talented Excursion:

On the 8 June, sixteen lucky Year 8 Math students had the privilege to attend an excursion to Holroyd High School with Miss Le. There we participated in a maths competition called *The Lachlan Macquarie College Yr 8 Mathematics Gifted and Talented Day*. This Year 8 Maths Gifted and Talented Day encourages students to broaden their knowledge and learning experiences within the maths course.

It was set out a little like *Tournament of the Minds* or the *Da Vinci Decathlon*. Once we got there we were split into three teams – table 1, table 2 and table 3 – and although we were all of the same school, it was each to their own. We were competing against a dozen other schools – the best of the best. In some cases, the one school had up to four or five teams meaning we had to go hard or go home if we were to pull out on top.

Throughout the day each group participated in various tasks such as problem solving, engineering, heads or tails, using logic, etc. Each question we tried to answer got harder as we went along. For some of them we spent a whole half hour just working on that one question. Miss Le couldn't even figure out one it was so difficult!!! Personally, my favourite part was the engineering activity. Each team was given a hand full of spaghetti, a roll of sticky tape, a piece of paper and the task to create a shape which could hold 200 Maltesers nice and neatly. That meant that once poured in they couldn't roll around, be stacked on top of one another or be able to roll out of the shape. At the end of the day all Elderslie teams had come along way and finished in the top eight.



A big thank you to Miss Le for organising such an event for the sixteen of us. We had great fun on this excursion and hope to have the opportunity to take part in something just as exciting as *The Lachlan Macquarie College Yr 8 Mathematics Gifted and Talented Day* again.

Homework Books

Students in Years 7-10 had Science Homework Booklets issued by their class teacher, during week 1 of Term 3. Homework reinforces concepts learnt in class and makes up a proportion of the student's final mark. Year 7-8 have an online subscription to STILE, which was a part of Year 7 course charges.

STILE has Science content from Australia's leading Science institution CSIRO, featuring relevant and current information.

Students will be provided with a booklet that guides learning. Please ensure that your child logs on weekly, sign on completion and shows their teacher. The code that is provided lasts 8 days and after that date your child will need to be reassigned another code.

Years 9 -10 will have hardcopy booklets, that they will write in and submit weekly to their teacher. Homework forms a part of student revision and promotes regular habits, which is an essential skill in their senior studies.

TAS Home Economics

Year 11 Textiles and Design

During Term One and Two, students in Year 11 Textiles and Design have been developing their skills in textile design, manufacture and decoration in the completion of their first project for the unit 'Bag Bonanza'. The students chose a bag design from a selection of patterns provided by the school and had to choose their fabrics and decoration techniques from one of four design inspirations including, Oriental Wonders, African Safari, Tribal Tributes and Vintage Vogue. Each student was required to complete an accompanying portfolio to document their design process. The students found the project challenging, yet enjoyable! Images of their work can be seen below.



Year 10 Textiles Technology

During Semester One, students in Year 10 Textiles Technology have been learning about Japanese culture and specific links to textile design and manufacture. Each student completed preliminary research on textile items used in Japanese culture and traditional textile fabric decoration techniques.

Students then used their knowledge in the design and manufacture of a textile furnishing item based on Japanese textile design. Each student chose different symbols to assemble using patchwork, appliqué, Shibori dyeing and Sashiko embroidery. Images of the students' work can be seen below.



On Monday 29 May, 2017 Year 9 and 10 Textiles Technology students participated in a fabric decoration workshop provided by a local supplier to learn new fabric colouration and decoration techniques which they will be able to use in their upcoming projects. Techniques included fabric marbling, sun painting, printing, fabric crayons and Shiva sticks. Below are some images of students enjoying the workshop.



Year 8 Textiles Enrichment Day

On Thursday 25 May, 2017 selected students from Year 8 participated in a textile enrichment day where they designed, created and decorated an individualised tote bag. During the earlier part of the day, students learnt several tie-dye techniques which allowed them to colour their bag. After this, students learnt how to use a material called Soluweb where they created their own personalised fabric to use for a motif on the front of their bag. Throughout the afternoon, students learnt how to use the sewing machine in the application of their embellishment techniques and final construction of their bag. All students thoroughly enjoyed the opportunity to extend their knowledge in the area of textiles. Images of student work and involvement can be seen below.



The project was a great success and provided students with the skills required for the second project on children's education.



Year 11 Design and Technology also visited the Powerhouse Museum in term 2. Students encountered some amazing new technologies and the physical products they helped to create. It is absolutely mind blowing what can be created with a laser cutter, 3D printer, sound recognition and coding software. Students attended a coding workshop during their visit which has inspired some interesting possible ideas for their major works.

To be honest I had no idea what I wanted to be when I left school, until I met my Textile teacher Ms Wheeler. She was an inspiration, an amazing aspirational teacher who is creative and showed me what it was like to be a designer.



I fell in love with design. I wanted to become Fashion Designer.

In Year 12, I came first in the State for 3 Unit Textile and Design and came in top 5% for 2 Unit Textiles for which I received The Premier's Award. I was accepted into UTS and completed Fashion and Textiles Degree, 4 year course with Second Class Honours.

Achievements since 1993

During University, I was a finalist in the Smirnoff Fashion Awards with my designs. When finishing University, I decided to do a Post Graduate Diploma in Education, Design and Technology, for the fear of not being able to find a design position. It was a cut throat industry and still is.

My first job was with Freidelle children's wear and this was prior to computers and designs were drawn by hand. I was travelling to Paris, London twice a year and was responsible for the range with little real industry experience.

Next was Skye group which is a group of brands where I designed Oshkosh children's wear, Pierre Cardin, Industrie Men's, TYR and Finz swimwear. Being a small company I had to design, source, spec tech, pattern make and follow each design to production.

I joined Seafolly as Senior Designer. This was a whole new world. I now have a huge team of graphic designers and pattern makers and assistants. I can focus on design and travel to exotic beach locations such as Ibiza, St Tropez, Paris, and London. I was fortunate to have my designs at the Mercedes Fashion Week this year.



Over my career I have been to many different countries such as Brazil, Germany, Hong Kong, Paris, China, India, Madrid, Nice, London, New York, Hawaii, Detroit and California.

There is a lot of pressure to perform, but I love my job. I wouldn't change it. There is nothing better than being overseas and seeing someone enjoy your product or reading comments on Instagram. It's so great to be able to do something you love for a career. It's a passion not a job.

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Changes for 2018 admissions



THERE ARE SOME IMPORTANT CHANGES FOR 2018 ADMISSIONS THROUGH UAC:

The number of course preferences is being reduced from 9 to 5

Offers were rarely made to preferences 6 to 9 in the old system and applicants can change their preferences as many times as they wish, so it's up to 5 preferences per offer round.

There will be an offer round after ATAR release and before Christmas

This is so that ATAR-based offers can be made to Year 12 students earlier than January.

The early January round and the mid-January round will be combined into one round in the second week of January

This is so that more offers can be made earlier in January.

Offers may not be made to all courses in December

Some universities may wait until January to make offers to highly competitive courses. Consequently, those courses will be excluded from the December offer round. Details of courses that will not be included in the December round will be available on UAC's website in November 2017.

Universities will not exhaust their quota of offers in December

While universities will be able to make offers to NSW HSC students in December, they will still be waiting for the results of other significant groups of students, such as IB students, interstate Year 12 students and current tertiary students. Consequently, universities will not fill the quota for any course in December; they will reserve sufficient offers to make offers to eligible students in January. The cut-off for entry in January Round 1 will not be higher than the December cut-off.

There will be no "Main Round"

As more offers will now be made in December, there will no longer be the concept of a January Main Round. We expect most offers will be made in December and January.

All offer rounds will be named using the convention of month and sequence (eg December Round 2, January Round 1 etc.).

There will be no restrictions on making offers in the early offer rounds

All offer rounds will be treated equally. Offers can be made to the highest eligible preference to any applicant in any round.

The SRS offer round will be in November

Offers to Year 12 students based on Schools Recommendation Schemes applications will be earlier; now mid-November.

These changes simplify the process for applicants and institutions, allowing offers to be made earlier in the cycle, where possible, while still giving applicants plenty of choice and without disadvantaging those applicants who will still need to wait until January to receive their offer.
