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PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

Student & Teacher Success

As announced in the previous issue of Parent Bulletin, we were delighted to hear that our very own Ms Linda Le was announced as the Public Education Foundation Teachers Health Early Career Teacher scholarship recipient. On May 21, I was proud to attend the awards ceremony along with Mrs Amos to watch Ms Le receive her award. Ms Le was the sole teacher in the state to be recognised with this award to acknowledge her passion for her subject of Mathematics and efforts in engaging students across the first three years of her teaching career. Ms Le will now have the opportunity to participate in international professional learning so that she can enhance her practice even further. The entire EHS teaching staff congratulates Ms Le on her success.



It has also been wonderful to see so many of our amazing student success stories in the past month. Our representative cross country athletes won the Zone Carnival on May 31 with many individual accolades being earned. A huge thank you to Ms Victoria Jeffries for her tireless efforts in ensuring all our students had every opportunity to participate at this level.

We have also been fortunate to once again see Elderslie High School well represented at the Department of Education's representative dance festivals. In 2018 the festival program, known as "In the Spotlight", will showcase the talents of two of our individual students, Lilibeth Dell (Year 12) and Savannah Nenadic (Year 7) who will feature in the combined NSW Public Schools Senior and Junior Dance Ensembles respectively. Aside from this, our Ballroom, Dance Company and Dance Ensemble group performances were all selected to perform along with two of our amazing public speakers, Emily Condon (Year 9) and Jaiden Gardner (Year 8) who successfully auditioned to compete one of the shows. Congratulations to all students.

Renovation Update

Most of the noisiest works within our renovation are coming to a conclusion now, with many aspects of external demolition complete. If you have driven down Hilder St recently, you would be able to see the new structures taking shape to mark the new entrances to the school, both near the current pedestrian gate and the bus bay. New pathways are being formed and the structure of the new glass waiting room is starting to appear. Our student body continues to display enormous tenacity in coping with a slightly restricted playground and changed pathways for movement around the school. The flexibility and understanding demonstrated by our students has been very much appreciated by our staff and we look forward to the point where we can all enjoy the improvements created in our school environment. At this stage, we are still due for completion at the end of July.

Testing – NAPLAN and National Minimum Standard

Our Year 7 and 9 students completed the National Assessment Program in Literacy and Numeracy from May 15-17. The staffs were very pleased with the students' efforts across all areas of the examinations. Although our school was not chosen for NAPLAN Online testing this year, we may still be asked to implement the new testing structure in 2019. While there has been much discussion in the media of late regarding the future of NAPLAN testing, no firm decisions have been made at this stage. Many Year 10 students recently participated in the first round of Minimum Standard Testing in Literacy and Numeracy. These tests, organised by Mrs Tracy Samuels (Head Teacher Secondary Studies) via NESA allowed students to participate in online quizzes to allow them to receive the HSC in 2020 or beyond. The Minimum Standards Tests allow students to show their skills in basic literacy and numeracy needed for everyday life. If students did not yet achieve this minimum standard, there will be another opportunity to do so late this year.

Year 7 2019 Enrolment

Thank you to the great many parents who have applied for their Year 6 children to attend Elderslie High School in 2019. As parents would know, our local area enrolments are guaranteed a place in next year's Year 7 cohort before we can offer any places to students beyond the local drawing area. As per the school's policy on out of area student enrolment, we have now convened our annual panel to consider all other applications and determined our offers along with our waiting list. Families will be advised of the outcome in the next few weeks. Those students being offered a place will then be sent enrolment forms which need to be returned to the school promptly.

Musical Success

Enormous congratulations to the Creative and Performing Arts faculty for their work in producing this year's

incredibly successful musical, A Chorus Line. I know of few schools who produce a musical every year simply due to the amount work involved and I would like to publicly acknowledge the work of our Relieving Head Teacher CAPA, Ms Samantha Dennis and her amazing team of Ms Rysko, Ms Prigg, Mr Webb, Mrs Carusi, Mrs Grimston-Eason along with Ms Gulley and Mr Baylis. The CAPA faculty strives to give our students amazing opportunities from performing on stage to learning the art of backstage sound and lighting and their tireless hours of work paid off with the most polished of performances. Our students never cease to amaze me with their performing arts talents and I know many of our school community members would join with me in commending the efforts of our students and staff. It was also wonderful to be able to host Stage 3 primary school students from Spring Farm and Elderslie Public Schools for our Matinee on May 31.

Skoolbag App

The Skoolbag App recently updated and there are a few changes parents need to consider. When opening the App it requests your email and you need to set up an account. The App prompts parents to select the year groups for your children. If you did this, you may not be receiving messages. We use the App to send out general messages to the whole school and do not at this stage send messages to only one year group. **To receive all the messages you need to unselect the Year groups your children are in.**

Travelling to and from School

Students travelling to and from school are expected to follow the EHS behaviour code at all times. If students are engaged in negative behaviour whilst in school uniform the Department of Education expects the school to implement its discipline policy, even if they are on their way to or from school. This is particularly important at places like Narellan Town Centre and in the main street of Camden. Unfortunately, the poor behaviour of a few students can have a big impact on the school's reputation in the community. We acknowledge that the vast majority of our students are appropriately behaved at all times.

Parent Teacher Night

The Parent Teacher night for Years 7-12 will be on Wednesday July 25. Reports for Year 11 were issued in Week 5 of Term 2 and reports for Year 7-10 will be issued in Week 9 of Term 2. Make sure you save the date for parent teacher night. Online bookings for school interviews will open in the last two weeks of this term.

Sorry Day On May 25, I took Maddison Kuiper of Year 8 and Piper La Hay of Year 11 to represent Elderslie High

School at the Sorry Day ceremony at Mount Annan Botanical Gardens. The official Sorry Day was on Saturday May 26 and commemorates the past mistreatment of Indigenous people. During the event there were speeches from two ladies who had both been taken from their families as young children and mistreated in children's homes. Both of these women lost their connections to family, land and culture. A representative from FACS also spoke about the role the Government agency had played in taking children away from their families. After the speeches, there was a smoking ceremony and we all walked through a bush path to the Sorry Day Memorial where Piper and Maddison laid a wreath from the school. After the ceremony everyone, walked to the Seedbank to partake in a celebratory lunch. A reminder for parents that the school NAIDOC week assembly is coming up on July 6. Parents are welcome to attend the assembly and the community lunch after the assembly.

Uniform

The vast majority of our students wear our uniform with pride at all times. At Elderslie High School, student uniforms are checked daily during roll call and students are followed up if they are not wearing our uniform. As the weather gets colder, we would appreciate it if all families could check that their children are well equipped with correct jumpers and jackets. Black, all leather shoes are also an essential component of our uniform and should not feature any white trimmings. Uniform items can be purchased online or at the uniform shop that is open before school each Monday or after school every Wednesday and Thursday.

Mobile Phone Use and Social Media

Every year, we speak to students about the appropriate use of phones and social media, with a great deal of time spent working with students to remind them when they have not used their phones responsibly or engaged in inappropriate contact using social media. Parents and students are reminded that sending or receiving child abuse material is a crime. It is also essential to emphasise that students are bound by the school's Mobile Phone and Internet Usage policies and while some of the interactions may occur before or after school, they can significantly impact the wellbeing and safety of students at school. Therefore, it is important that we seek support from parents in monitoring their child's phone usage and support the school's policies.

Year 12 News

Year 12 should have just completed their third assessment task and would now have some valuable feedback and a new focus for their improvement. The next step in their HSC campaign is the Trial HSC Examination starting 25 June, 2018. PBL REPORT

Be reflective at the canteen!

Students have explored what it means to be reflective at the canteen. Managing our time effectively during breaks can lead to making healthier food choices when at the canteen. During DEAR students watched a video clip outlining the effects too much sugar can have on our bodies and our learning. Eating too many sugary foods and drinks can make you feel full for a while but your body misses out on the good stuff, like proteins, vitamins and minerals, the important fuel for growth and learning development. Students discussed the importance of managing their break to ensure they have time to view the menu, choose healthier options and sit and eat without being rushed. When we are rushed for time, we don't always put a lot of thought into what we choose from the menu and can often pick foods that are easy to eat on the run. Often these foods fall into the sometimes category on the Healthy Food plate, things like sugary drinks and foods with no nutritional value. If our body is not fuelled by nutritional foods our concentration, organisational skills and energy levels suffer. We are being reflective when we manage eating times and make healthy choices.

The Mock Trial Competition is organised through the Law



Society NSW, and involves school teams opposing each other in 'mock' court cases. The cases are either civil or criminal, and each school

is allocated as either the defence or prosecution. The cases are scripted by the Law Society NSW, and are designed to engage the students in various legal matters. Elderslie High School has had a long running tradition of success in the competition, with Ms Dennis and Ms Roberts leading the teams in previous years.

This year's Mock Trial Team is comprised of four Year 11 students, fifteen Year 10 students and Ms Farrar as the teacher coordinator. The Year 11 students typically perform the speaking roles of barristers, whilst the Year 10 students usually undertake witness or court duty roles.

So far, the team has successfully won both point scoring trials, against Broughton Anglican College and Mount Annan Christian College. Our next trial is scheduled against St Patricks College for Girls, Campbelltown.

Previous successful applicants from our school have said it helped them with their confidence and leadership qualities and that they really loved and appreciated the experience. AGRICULTURE NEWS

So much exciting news!

Camden Show

Students from Years 7 -10 assisted with the preparation of our poultry and of our display for this year's **Camden Show** and it was pleasing to see the older students guiding the younger ones in such a positive manner. As Camden Show is only a few days before we need to take our poultry into Sydney Royal, we only enter a small team in the School's section at Camden. We were very pleased to learn that our team came first in this section.

A team of very enthusiastic students competed in the Young Farmers Challenge and, although they didn't place this year, they represented the school proudly.

Our Paddock to Plate Display in the School's Tent was on Bees. It showed the stages involved in the production of honey as well as the important role that bees play in the pollination of many of our crops. There were lots of activities for the young spectators who were guided by our students manning the display throughout the two days of the show. Thanks to the dedicated students who gave up many hours of their time to help with the display and who encouraged the young visitors to use the interactive components of the display.

Sydney Royal Show

On the day before the Easter break, 150 of our Agriculture students attended an excursion to the **Sydney Royal Show** where they were able to see, first hand a, large selection of the different breeds of livestock involved in Australian Agriculture.

Poultry

Each year, we load up our trailer and take a large team of poultry into Sydney Royal. One of the highlights is rearing our meat birds for the Meat Bird Pairs Competition. We receive 14 day old meat birds 6 weeks before the show and a team of dedicated students rear them, record their growth rate and feed intake as well as monitoring climatic conditions.

This year we were very proud to be invited by the RAS and Stegglers to take part in a video showing our journey growing and preparing our meat birds for competition. The film crew spent a day in the Ag Plot filming students carrying out a range of activities with the birds. The video was shown continually on 2 large screens in the poultry pavilion throughout the 12 days of the show. Elderslie already has a fantastic reputation amongst the poultry fraternity at the show and this video continued to show the school in a very favorable light.

We have a large range of pure breeds at school and many of these were entered in the Schools Classes. We also enter the Hyline Egg Laying Competition where we received 6 young birds late last year and then select a team of 3 to enter the show.

The week before the show is incredibly hectic. The birds need to go into the Royal 3 days after our local Camden Show. We have a bit of a production line going with the more experienced students supervising the washing and the younger students are always keen to do the blow drying. Eventually, our 40 birds were ready for the show. Our results this year were fantastic. The Meat Bird competition had entries from 75 schools around NSW. Our Meat Bird Male Pair was awarded first place and hence the Championship Award. Our Male AND Female Meat Bird Carcasses also won first place in their respective classes

and the males were then awarded the Champion Meat Bird Carcass. This made us the most successful school in this completion. We came home from the show with the wonderful Sydney Royal Medallion, 3 beautiful glass trophies and a very substantial amount of prize money. This is the 3rd year in a row that we have won the overall competition.

In the School Pure Breeds classes we won 8 Championship Ribbons and one Reserve Champion making us the Most Successful School Exhibitor in the poultry classes.

Five of our very keen student; Olivia De La Mare, Hannah Jenkins, Logan Ockers, Jacob Evans and Bryce Bachner competed with 45 others in the Poultry Showmanship Competition, where they presented their chosen bird, discussed its features and answer any questions that the judge asked. This is a fantastic opportunity for students with a passion for poultry to demonstrate their skills. All of the students spoke with knowledge and confidence. Hannah was awarded 2nd place and Olivia 3rd. The students were treated like celebrities whenever they went into the poultry pavilion wearing their Elderslie Agriculture shirts and came home from the event full of enthusiasm to plan the breeding program for the year.

Alpacas

On Easter Monday, the Alpaca Team: Chloe Gardner, Breanna Craig, Mikayla Craig, Jaiden Gardner, Angel Greener, Caitlin Green, Caitlyn Greenland and Maddison Hallworth, took 8 alpacas to Sydney Royal to compete in the Alpaca Showmanship and Stockmanship classes. The team have spent many hours patiently training the animals for this event. Chloe was awarded 1st place in her stockmanship class and Breanna was awarded 4th place. Special mention was made of Jaiden for his fantastic handling of his animal. In the schools class the following day, the Elderslie Team came 4th.

Animal Nursery News

Our Animal Nursery at Cobbitty Markets continues to be popular with both our students, who generously volunteer their time to help, and with the young visitors to the markets. It is a pleasure to hear so many positive comments about our students from the parents who bring their children to visit. Year 12 Biology Excursion to the Museum of Human Disease

On Monday May 28 our senior Biology students attended the UNSW Museum of Human Disease. This excursion was to supplement coursework for the Search for Better Health unit of work. The students engaged in investigating various interesting and confronting specimens of disease. They

gathered information on the cause, symptoms, treatment and prevention of infectious and non-infectious diseases. PATHWAYS TO DREAMING

This term our Year 8 Aboriginal students joined the Pathways to Dreaming program.

What is Pathways To Dreaming?

Pathways to Dreaming is designed to engage Year 8 to 12 Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students in education. Students are mentored by Western Sydney University students and alumni, who act as older friends to support and encourage them to achieve their aspirations. They take part in academic and Aboriginal cultural enrichment workshops at the University and the cohort at each school devises and implements a group project, with mentors facilitating that process. At the end of each year there is a celebratory event where the group projects are showcased.

Students join the program from Year 8 and continue until they finish school.

The program is currently running in 30 South-Western and Western Sydney high schools in the Campbelltown, Liverpool, Penrith, Fairfield, Blacktown and Blue Mountains areas.

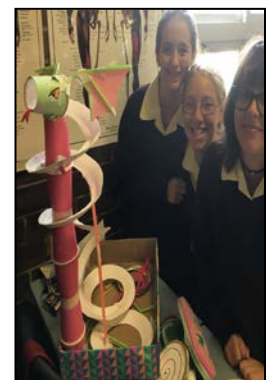
Achievements since 2016
