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PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

Welcome

I would especially like to welcome our new students including our incoming Year 7 cohort. We are delighted to have each and every new student with us and look forward to getting to know them as well as their families. For those parents who are joining the Elderslie High School community for the first time, I remind you that we happy to help in any way that we can if you have an issue or a question that needs answering. The first few weeks of your child's high school life are often a time of heightened anxiety and we have a depth of experience in supporting children and parents through these uncertain weeks. Please understand that when you contact us via the front office or the telephone, that our staff are often on class and will return your call as soon as they can. Mr Burke had been fulfilling a range of other roles within the Department of Education and returns to our staff this year. I would like to acknowledge the amazing work of Ms Samantha Dennis who has filled this role over the past four years. Ms Dennis has done a phenomenal job and we are truly grateful for her dedication over the past four years to the relieving role. Ms Dennis continues as a very valuable member of the team in 2019.

Our School Counsellor positions are currently being filled. We are aware that Mr Paul O'Reilly will be with us for 2 days per week and we await advice as to additional staff for this important role.

Student Success

At the end of 2018, I was delighted to advise the school community of the success of our students in the 2018 HSC. Many parents may remember our jubilation at the news that not one but two of our students were named as first in the state in one of their subjects. This honour went to the very hard working Lachlan Willingham (General Mathematics) and also to the amazing Hannah Jenkins (Textiles & Design). Additionally, we learned late in the term that Mariale Truong was placed tenth in the state in Extension 2 English. Mariale was named our dux of 2018 with an ATAR of 99.3. We also had a multitude of other

students earn ATAR results in the 90 range. Whatever the results of our students, we are very proud of the deep partnerships that our students enter into with their teachers to achieve these results. Our staff work tirelessly with our students in class time, at lunchtimes and through digital means such as Google Classroom and via email to provide support and feedback and I would like to commend them for their ongoing commitment to student excellence. Once again, Elderslie High School has attained the best HSC results of all public schools in the Macarthur area and one of the very best amongst all schools locally.

Ongoing School Improvements

As many of our parents would know, 2018 was a year in which the school underwent a major renovation of our entrance and front office. In line with our commitment to the ongoing improvement of the school environment, we have begun work on our renovated basketball court and COLA area. Tradesmen have been working on this throughout the school holidays and we anticipate its completion by the end of February. The end result will be a new coloured surface as well as new basketball rings which will certainly be welcome for our PDHPE lessons as well as by our active students at lunchtimes. In the interim, we are unable to use this space.

Cooler Classrooms

Elderslie High School has met the state government criteria for the Cooler Classrooms program in which air-conditioners are installed in all learning spaces. This installation has started over the school holidays and will continue into the start of the term. We are delighted to know that our students and staff will experience classrooms that are temperature controlled throughout the hotter months. The program will also see the removal of unflued gas heaters from classrooms. It should be noted however that not all installations will be complete in time for the certainty of the first forty degree day in February.

School Community Charter

At Elderslie High School we are so fortunate to have established strong partnerships with our community including our parents and partner primary schools. Of course, all schools aim to create supportive and cohesive environments where these strong partnerships flourish because we know children thrive when we all work together. To this end, it is really crucial that students, staff and parents all understand how they can play their part in developing these strong relationships and that is why the Department of Education has released its new School Community Charter. Unfortunately, across the whole of the state, there have been instances where community members have displayed behaviour that is inappropriate, disrespectful and at times, intimidating. This has no place in our schools as we all have a right to a safe workplace. I

have included a copy of the charter in this edition of the Parent Bulletin.

Parent & Citizens Meetings

A warm welcome is extended to all parents who would like to attend our Parents & Citizens Association meetings. P&C Meetings are an excellent way to stay in touch with what is going on at the school. We meet in the Library twice per term on Tuesday evenings in Week 3 and 7 from 7pm. P&C Meetings are attended by the Principal, Deputy Principals and faculty representatives. Parents are addressed by students from our Student Representative Council about leadership endeavours within the school and a faculty presentation takes place on each occasion meaning that we certainly do a whole lot more than talk about fund raising. P&C members are always the first parents we call on to participate in recruiting new staff for the school so members get to have a real say in the staff that are in front of their children. Our first P&C meeting for the year will be on Tuesday, February 12.

FROM THE DEPUTY PRINCIPAL'S

Welcome Back to 2019

Welcome to the beginning of the 2019 school year! I am very excited to be working this year with the students of Years 7, 9 and 11 and while I am well acquainted with Years 9 and 11, it will be wonderful to get to know our new Year 7 students. I am also delighted to be working alongside some great Year Advisers who have responsibility for the year groups in my care including Mrs Karen White (Year 7), Ms Helen Sakr (Year 9) and Mr Scott Atterton (Year 11). We have lots of fantastic things planned for each year group to look forward to.

Year 7 Begin Their High School Lives

It is, of course, quite normal for students to be a little anxious as they make the big leap from primary to high school. Many students will have come to us with a great many friends from their primary schools, whereas others may have few, if any, known peers. Hopefully, following the activities undertaken in the first few days and the swimming carnival, Year 7 have started to forge new friendships and are becoming more familiar with high school life.

The first big event for Year 7 is the upcoming camp and if past camps are anything to go by, this one will be another opportunity to establish lifelong memories that are often recalled many years later when students are exiting school. I strongly encourage your child to attend. If parents have any questions about academic progress, social development, camp or other school matters, these should

be referred to Mrs White and the Assistant Year Adviser, Miss Sproule.

Year 11 and Year 9 Subject Changes

Each year, at the commencement of Year 9 and Year 11, a small number of students express a desire to change an elective subject. Students have been informed that they have until end of Week 3 (Friday 15 February) to make any changes. After this date it will no longer be possible, as too much course work will have been missed. If your child wishes to change an elective, they are required to provide a note from home outlining the reasons for requesting the change. I will then meet with them to see if there is any availability in the elective classes. Please be aware that some subjects have limited spaces and it will not be possible to meet all requests.

Assessment Guidelines

The school assessment guidelines were distributed to all students during Week 2. During the presentation students were reminded of the importance of following school policy around attendance and completion of assessment tasks including illness, extensions and misadventure procedures. If any student was absent from the presentation, they will need to see their relevant Deputy Principal to collect and sign for the documentation that was issued.

Starting off with Good Habits

With the start of a new year, it is an ideal time for students to develop good habits for study and school. My key tips are:

1. Organise yourself the night before – check your timetable and pack your bag. This will eliminate the mad rush in the morning.
2. Use your student diary – use it every lesson to record homework, assessment details and store notes for home. Putting this information in writing and in one place will give you a check list to help you complete all tasks by their due date.
3. Review your class notes each evening. This may only take five minutes per subject and it has been proven to be one of the best methods of improving a person's understanding of key facts.
4. Have a quiet place to study. Parents can support their children in the quest to get organised by providing them with a quiet place to do their work that is free of distractions (such as mobile phones, television and tablets).

2018 Reports

Students who did not pick up their reports at the end of last year will need to collect it from their Year Adviser.

Year 8

Elderslie High School provides many extra-curricular activities for students. These activities include, dance ensembles, animal nursery, Rural Youth, Event Management Team, gifted and talented group, drama club, art club, school musical, orchestra, knockout sports, public speaking and debating. If your child is having difficulty with friendship and belonging they could become part of one of these groups. If you are unsure how to arrange this, you can ring the Year Adviser, Mrs Jeffries who can refer you to the correct staff member. Students who participate in these groups are highly valued and appreciated by our school community and students develop a greater sense of self-worth and confidence.

In June this year students will have the opportunity to choose three electives which will become part of their curriculum pattern in Year 9 and 10. Information about this will be communicated to parents during Term 2.

Year 10

All students in Year 10 will be working towards achieving their Record of School Achievement this Year. To achieve this milestone, students are required to maintain above 85 per cent attendance, complete classwork each lesson and complete all of their assessment tasks in every subject. Students in Year 10 are required to come prepared for school and apply diligence and sustained effort throughout the whole year. They are required to follow the Elderslie High School Assessment Policy, which will be issued at the beginning of Term 1.

Students also need to start thinking about the courses they would like to choose for Year 11, 2020. There will be a subject selection evening in June this year where students will be given the opportunity to find out about Stage 6 courses. It is expected that all students attend this evening with their parents.

Year 12 Subject Changes

Welcome back to all of our returning students in Year 12. Mrs Shortt is now the Year Adviser and I will be working closely with her to ensure that all students have a fabulous and memorable final year of high school.

Students who have submitted a subject change form and participated in an interview have been approved to drop a subject from the beginning of this term. Students are required to attend private study periods in the senior learning hub in the school library, where they are expected to use the time effectively by completing homework, subject summaries, participate in careers counselling, research, meet with teachers and completing assessments. Students in Year 12 will not be given permission to go home early if their lessons are completed for the day. The school provides teacher supervision for private study

periods and students can access further educational support from our Senior Studies Teacher Mentor. We have very dedicated staff who willingly assist students in achieving their personal best. Providing these structures for senior students has developed a culture of learning which has contributed to our school achieving above State average HSC results in 2017 and 2018.

Uniforms

The expectation is that all students in Year 7-12 are in the correct school uniform. Last year some students were still wearing the old uniform, in particular the light brown pants and shorts. I would like to reinforce that this colour is no longer included as part of the school uniform and all boys need to wear grey shorts and pants which are available for purchase at our school uniform shop. All students are also required to wear plain black leather shoes without logos or branding in contrasting colours and patterns. Please read the next paragraph, which includes a section of the Department of Education's Uniform Policy.

'The department supports the wearing of school uniform which promotes a sense of belonging for students and creates a positive identity for the school community. School uniforms also contribute to the personal safety of students by allowing easier recognition of students inside the school and in the community. A school uniform should promote the health and safety of students by identifying items necessary for particular activities to protect students from injury (for example, safe footwear).'
