Year 7 and 9 - NAPLAN Online 2019

As I mentioned in the previous newsletter, our school will be completing NAPLAN Online this year. The trial tests took place last term and except for a few minor issues at the start, we successfully trialled all Year 7 and 9 students.

The official National Assessment Program – Literacy and Numeracy will be held in Weeks 3 and 4. Over the two-week window, all students in Year 7 and 9 will complete tests in Writing, Language Conventions, Reading and Numeracy.

Throughout the testing window, there will be times where we endeavour to catch up students who may have been absent on the testing date, but we would encourage all students to be present for each test.

Natalie Martin (DP Years 8, 10 & 12)

Year 10

This term I will be meeting with students who were issued with multiple N-Warning letters. Students who are not applying diligence and sustained effort to their course work, including failure to submit assignments will place them at risk of not achieving their RoSA. A further consequence of not achieving the RoSA is the possibility of repeating Year 10 in 2020. Attendance is another factor that can affect academic achievement. It is a requirement of the Department of Education that all students attend school above 85 per cent of the time.

Year 12

This term all of Year 12 participated in a workshop that focused on the importance of using feedback from their teachers to improve their academic performance. Feedback is the overall interaction between a teacher and student. Educational research conducted by John Hattie indicates that feedback has the greatest impact on improving student achievement. Feedback is essential for maximising student potential, raising awareness and improving strengths. Good feedback practice helps students take control of their own learning by becoming self-regulated learners. Self-regulated learning emphasises autonomy and control over the learning process: students who ask questions, take notes, and allocate their time and resources effectively are self-regulated learners. They create 'internal feedback' and 'cognitive routines' in their learning.

Feedback is an essential part of student learning. It helps students understand the subject being studied and gives them clear guidance on how to improve their learning. Students, who engage with feedback, should enhance learning and improve assessment performance. During the workshop students learned the importance of feedback and had the opportunity to read over the feedback provided to them in their recent English assessment task. Students completed a worksheet where they identified the useful feedback and how and when they intended to implement the feedback.

The aim of this activity is to improve student ability to take responsibility for their own learning and achieve their own personal best results. The school focus on student use of feedback has significantly contributed to our school's HSC performance over the last two years where our overall HSC results were above State and Statistically Similar School group averages.

Parent Teacher Night

Parent teacher night was held on Monday 6 May for students in Year 7, 11 and 12. This year the interview times were increased to seven minutes per student to allow for longer conversations with teachers about student academic, welfare and behaviour concerns. The evening was very successful with over 750 individual bookings. The next parent teacher night will be for all students from Years 7-12 on Monday 29 July after the half-yearly reports are distributed.

Aboriginal Education

Miss George is now leading Aboriginal Education at Elderslie High School. In Term 1, six of our Aboriginal student leaders



participated in the junior Aboriginal Educational Consultative Group (AECG) meeting at Spring Farm Public School. The junior AECG meets once a term and meetings are rotated between Elderslie High School, Spring Farm Public School, Cobbitty Public School and Mawarra Public School. At the meetings students participate in cultural activities and are involved in consultation regarding school and Department of Education Policy implementation.

Our school also participates in Pathways to Dreaming, which is a partnership with Western Sydney University. The program provides mentoring and regular excursions for each participating student. The program is available to all Aboriginal students from Years 8-12 and aims to increase student aspiration to achieve higher levels of education.

Q&A with the Office of the eSafety Commissioner

Meningococcal ACWY Vaccination Program

Information from the Ministry of Health about Meningococcal ACWY is provided below. Meningococcal ACWY is a vaccine for students 15 years and over. A vaccine that protects against four strains of meningococcal disease will again be provided to secondary students in NSW via the NSW School Vaccination Program in 2019.

Elderslie High School will soon be issuing consent forms for Meningococcal ACWY vaccinations as part of the School Vaccination Program in 2019. The vaccination consent card will be issued to all students in Year 10, allowing them to receive the meningococcal ACWY (MenACWY) vaccine later in the year.

This vaccine is different to the meningococcal C (MenC) vaccine that children born between 2003 and 2018 were offered at the age of 12 months under the National Immunisation Program, as the MenACWY vaccine protects against an additional three strains of meningococcal disease).

The NSW School Vaccination Program has provided MenACWY vaccine to older adolescents - who are at increased risk of meningococcal disease - since 2017, which Elderslie High School took part in.

To ensure all older adolescents have the opportunity to protect themselves against meningococcal disease caused by strains A,C,W and Y, anyone between the ages of 15 and 19 years who missed the vaccine at school can access free vaccine from their GP.

This vaccine does not protect against all strains of meningococcal, so all people should be aware of the signs and symptoms of meningococcal disease, even if they are vaccinated.

Alert by the NSW Department of Education Keep coughing kids at home and see your GP

Whooping Cough (also called Pertussis) began increasing across NSW towards the end of 2018, especially in children between the ages of 5 and 14 years. NSW Health anticipates that this increase will continue into 2019.

School-aged children who are infected with whooping cough usually experience a troubling cough that can persist for months, but they rarely get severe illness. However they can spread the infection to younger siblings and other more vulnerable people, who are at higher risk of severe disease. Whooping cough can be a life threatening infection in babies.

What can you do to prevent whooping cough?

- Make sure vaccinations are up to date for all family members
- 1. Be alert for symptoms of whooping cough
- 2. Keep coughing kids home, to prevent them spreading the infection to others, and see your GP to get them tested for whooping cough

They took these animals to the show to compete in the stockmanship and showmanship competitions and came home with several ribbons. Chloe Gardner was also a finalist in the Junior Rural Ambassador program at the show so, in between showing alpacas, she was involved in a range of stewarding and organisational activities for various events around the show. This was a great experience for her and she represented the school proudly.

This year Our Paddock to Plate Display in the School's Tent was on coffee. It showed the stages involved in the production of coffee as well as many of the alternate uses of coffee and methods for utilising coffee waste such as the production of coffee cups, use as a biofuel and even as a road base. We were very pleased to learn that our team came $\mathbf{1}^{\text{st}}$ in this section.

A team of very enthusiastic students, Breanna Craig, Summer Jeffries, Jaiden Gardner and Mikayla Craig competed in the Young Farmers Challenge, racing through a range of tasks that a farmer may be faced with during a day on the farm. This has become a bit of a tradition for Elderslie High School and the team are always encouraged by a very vocal cheer squad. We

were very excited to see them become the Champion school team.





Sydney Royal Show

On the day before the Easter break, 140 of our Agriculture students attended an excursion to the **Sydney Royal Show** where they were able to see firsthand a large selection of the different breeds of livestock involved in Australian Agriculture.

Poultry

Each year we load up our trailer and take a large team of poultry into Sydney Royal. One of the highlights is rearing our meat birds for the Meat Bird Pairs Competition. We receive 12 day old meat birds 6 weeks before the show and a team of dedicated students rear them, record their growth rate and feed intake as well as monitoring climatic conditions. This year the competition had entries from 82 schools around NSW. Our Meat Bird Female Pair was awarded first place and the males fifth place. The birds then go onto the next stage of the competition where they are processed and the carcasses are judged. Our male carcasses came 2nd and our female carcasses came 3rd. We also received several ribbons for our pure breed birds in the schools classes, including Champion Hard Feather Bantam.

Two of our very keen poultry experts, Logan Ockers and Jacob Evans competed in the Poultry Showmanship Competition where they present their chosen bird, discuss its features and answer any questions that the judge may ask. This is a fantastic opportunity for students with a passion for poultry to demonstrate their skills. Both of the students spoke with knowledge and confidence and Jacob was awarded 5th place.







Alpacas

Chloe Gardner gave up most of her holidays working in the Little Hands on the Land helping young children lead alpacas around the "farm". On Easter Monday the Alpaca Team, Chloe Gardner, Breanna Craig, Mikayla Craig, Angel Greener, Caitlin Green, Caitlyn Greenland, Eva Kramer, Jade Cox, Kaitlin Furchtman and Bree Barlow took 6 alpacas to Sydney Royal to compete in the Alpaca Showmanship and Stockmanship classes. The team have spent many hours patiently training the animals for this event. All girls came away with ribbons for the various events and deserve congratulations for the excellent work they have done with these animals.

Message From the ARCO

"I'm offended!"

Being offended is subjective; it has everything to do with us as individuals, as a society, or a collective, and is often dependent on moral conditioning and/or religious beliefs. What offends one person may not offend another. However it is up to us to ensure positivity and respect is present in all aspects of school life at Elderslie High School. The notion of 'sticks and stones may break my bones, but words will never harm me' is a much too simplistic way of viewing the world. By normalising hate speech, such as claiming "there are two sides to every story" and minimising the effect it has on victims we are indirectly saying that it is acceptable. With many topics it is important to have a balanced argument, but it is equally as important that the argument is based on fact. Topics such as refugees, Indigenous people, the LGBTQI+ community, religion, migrants, mental illness and politics can become heated very quickly. Before taking part in such a discussion, it is important to consider whether your words can cause harm. If they can cause harm, then they are not welcome. Free speech is not absolute, and like any human right, free speech carries with it responsibilities. We have to speak in ways that don't harm people, and this a critical limitation of freedom of speech in Australia. This limitation is of absolute importance to ensure discriminatory legislation is upheld and that hate crimes, and physical violence do not occur. Even if people are adamant in their views, consideration of the feelings of others is paramount. As staff, we would all like to think that no one in our school community would willingly want to hurt another person, be it emotionally or physically. If someone prefers to be addressed in a certain way, or wears clothing different to what may be expected, what does it matter? Even if people cannot understand why another person is the way they are, they can still show empathy and relate on a more human level. To guote another: "T.H.I.N.K before you speak: Is it true? Is it helpful? Is it inspiring? Is it necessary? Is it kind".

 Who would have thought I would end up be back where it all started!!















Dear Parents/Carers,

At Elderslie High School, we aim to create a safe and supportive school community for everyone.

You are an important part of our work to prevent bullying and to respond effectively if it happens. Stopping bullying involves everyone.

We are sending you a pocket card from Bullying. No Way! with tips on what to do if your child talks to you about bullying. Parents know their children best and know the best way to tailor communication to their needs. Adapt these tips to what works for you and your child.

If your child talks to you about bullying:

- 1. Listen calmly and get the full story.
- Reassure your child that they are not to blame.
- 3. Ask your child what they want to do about it and how you can help.
- Visit www.bullyingnoway.gov.au to find some strategies.

6. Check in regularly with your child.

5. Contact the school,

If your child talks to you about bullying:

- 1. Listen calmly and get the full story. Your calm response is important to allow your child to tell you all about the situation. After they've told you their story, ask questions to get more details if you need: who, what, where, when. Although you may feel some strong emotions about your child's experience, try to keep calm to avoid more distress to your child.
- 2. Reassure your child they are not to blame. Many children blame themselves and this may make them feel even worse. You could say things like, 'That sounds really hard to deal with. No one should have to put up with that.' or 'I'm so glad you told me. You should be able to feel safe at school; that's not fair at all'.
- 3. Ask your child what they want to do and what they want you to do. A critical part of your response is to avoid jumping in to solve the problem. While it is natural to want to protect your child, helping them to find their own solution is a better option. It helps them feel they have some power in the situation.
- 4. Visit www.bullyingnoway.gov.au to find some strategies. The website has tips and ideas for different bullying situations. One idea is to practise strategies at home to help your child feel more confident.
- 5. Contact the school. Your child may be reluctant for you to do this, so discuss the idea and reassure them that the school would want to know and is able to help. Make an appointment to meet with your child's Year Adviser and, if you need to, ask to talk with the Deputy Principal. Contact the school immediately if you have a concern about your child's safety.
- 6. Check in regularly with your child. Keep the conversation going. It can take time to resolve issues, so check in regularly with your child about their experiences and their feelings. Your ongoing support is important.

At Elderslie High School, we have a number of strategies and communication topics that are presented to students to help prevent bullying and also address it when it arises. These include the following:
