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PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

I can hardly believe it is almost the end of the academic year, and what a year 2020 has been. Despite the difficulties thrust onto our world by the pandemic, schools have all risen to the challenge and found new and innovative ways to support our students both in the classroom and in other areas such as welfare. We've developed remote learning platforms, managed school sport, run virtual assemblies and graduated the Year 12 class of 2020 under strict conditions. I would like to thank all our families and our amazing staff for their patience, flexibility and resilience in these most trying of times. I'm certainly looking forward to what I hope will be a more settled year for our whole community in 2021. In the run up to the end of 2020 however, I wish all families a safe holiday, when we finally make it there!

Staffing update

I am very pleased to announce that Mr Dave Buckley has been reappointed to our school in the Science faculty. Mr Buckley had retired from teaching altogether but has been working with casually with us for some time. Despite this, he was successful in his application to be reappointed permanently. Mr Buckley is an outstanding teacher with 40 years of teaching experience behind him. Our students are very lucky to have someone of his experience back in the classroom. At the time of writing, we are in the process of recruiting a Head Teacher Teaching and Learning, which is a new executive position for our staff. This new role will see the school's executive team increase from 11 Head Teachers to 12. We know that this additional role will support the implementation of our goals within the new school plan, especially those related to our core business of consistent high-quality teaching and learning practices.

The end of an academic year is always a time for staff movement and this year, we will be farewelling a number of staff as they move on to new schools. Firstly, Mrs Danielle Saunders and Ms Georgie Rysko have both been appointed to Oran Park High School which is increasing in size each year. Both Mrs Saunders and Ms Rysko have made outstanding contributions to Elderslie High School. Mrs Karen White, our Teacher Librarian has temporarily taken up a role at Chester Hill High School. Mrs White anticipates her return to Elderslie in 2022. Her appointment means that we have also needed to recruit a new Year Adviser for Year 9, 2021 and I'm delighted to announce that Ms Victoria Petinos is the successful staff member taking on this role. Finally, we say farewell to a



number of our casual teachers currently on temporary contracts including Ms Wendy Xu, Ms Ellouise Liston, Ms Tarin Palmer, Ms Alison Bargarey, Mrs Amanda Luppino and Ms Laura Reece. At this stage of the year, we are still hoping to be able to find roles for some of our amazing casual teachers and will advise more as soon as we can.

COVID Update

It was most certainly a relief to finalise the HSC examination period with no positive COVID cases in our school community. As you will remember from the last edition of Parent Bulletin, all schools were required to have a contingency plan in which we planned for alternate venues just in case the Elderslie High School site was to have closed. We were so lucky to have the incredible support of our colleagues at Spring Farm, Mawarra and Elderslie Public Schools who, without a moment's hesitation, offered us their auditoriums and library spaces, should we have needed them. The contingency operation was extensively planned with furniture having been moved into position in all three alternate venues. Thank goodness we didn't need to activate the plan! Despite this, I would like to extend my sincere thanks to these amazing partner primary schools for their support.

A couple of weeks ago, the Department released further COVID guidelines for schools to implement. Here is a short summary of some of the most notable changes:

- Excursions can recommence under strict guidelines.
- End of year functions and school formals can go ahead under strict guidelines.
- While presentation ceremonies can go ahead with parental participation, there are extremely restrictive guidelines that must be followed. These guidelines will make it impossible to have as many parents as we might like because of the distances that must be maintained between adults from different households and the maximum number of adults that be housed in our auditorium. At present, we are still trying work out how our event will run and parents will be advised as soon as possible.
- Parents and Citizens Association Meetings can take place once again in a face to face manner.

Oak Grove Renovation

We are getting very excited that the long-awaited renovation of our Oak Grove section of our playground is looking like a reality. I have now signed off on the new design and have had the opportunity to share it with staff, students and the school's Parents and Citizens Association. The new design will feature a significant amount of synthetic turf as well as new seating and covered picnic tables for student use. The design will keep the existing solar shelter for shade but see this space renovated in keeping with the new look. The memorial garden within the Oak Grove will also be retained. At this stage, the Department's Asset Management Unit advises me that the new space should be fully complete approximately one month into the new school year with the majority of works to take place over the school holidays.

Thank You for Your Input

Of late there have been quite a few surveys for Elderslie High School parents to fill in. Most notably, there has been the "Tell Them From Me" survey as well the Customer Service 360° survey. We are very grateful for the input of all those families who took the time to provide your thoughts. I know you are all very busy with your own working and family lives and I certainly appreciate your input. Both these surveys assist us in the continuous process of improvement and are critical in informing executive decision making.

The theme of NAIDOC week was 'Always Was Always Will Be' which recognises that First Nations people have occupied and cared for this continent for over 65,000 years. I think we have



a lot to learn from our Indigenous culture in terms of looking after our environment so that it can sustain future generations.



Lego Robotics

I have been coordinating a team of students and working with Mrs Nath who competed in the First Lego League Replay Challenge at Unity Grammar School in Austral. Our students have had to work together to code the Spike Prime Lego Robotics to complete as many missions as possible within two and a half minutes. This is the first time the school has entered a robotics competition and I am very proud of the team values that they have demonstrated in preparing for the event and competing on the day. The values they demonstrated were teamwork, innovation, fun, discovery, impact and inclusion. During the event students worked together to present the processes they went through in readiness for the competition. I am very proud of our students and their achievement in this challenge. Next year we plan to enter two teams into the competition and offer the opportunity to more students in our school.

As part of the Multicultural Day activities, our school used the day as an opportunity to launch the Stymie platform that has been purchased with funds from the school's P&C. Stymie is an online notification website where any student can anonymously report incidents of bullying and harm.

There are multiple benefits for using Stymie for students and the school. These include encouraging our students by being upstanders who supports their peers during a time of need. A parent information sheet has been provided with the newsletter.

To make an anonymous notification, students access the website <u>www.stymie.com.au</u> and complete the details. The student does need to verify that the information they are providing is truthful. The notification is then sent onto the school and a relevant staff member will receive the information.

Students will still be encouraged to report issues to their relevant Year Adviser or Deputy Principal, but we are looking



forward to students using the platform to have a stronger voice against bullying.

Drink Bottles



This year, we are proud to support Westmead Children's Hospital and their willingness to actively build a positive festive spirit for those children who are restricted to be in hospital, during a time of joy and celebration. This Christmas, there will be approximately 300 children, between the ages of 11-18, who will miss such gatherings, and may not be able to celebrate the joys that occur with the holidays. This year, SRC are hoping to donate over 100 toys for children, in hope to share and give light, especially in uncertain times. Purchase a <u>new</u> toy (e.g gift cards, packaged, or plush toys) and deliver to the SRC Helper's (who will be visiting in DEAR), or place under the Christmas Tree located in the Library.

"My brother and I were born with a genetic immune condition, that essentially means who do not have enough of the "good stuff" that helps fight the bad stuff. Jacob (Year 10), is currently in hospital recovering from his bone marrow transplant and will be out in time for Christmas. However, others are not so lucky. I encourage you to think of those children who may not be able to have a normal Christmas at home, and must remain in hospital for the sake of their health."

NAIDOC Week

NAIDOC Week was celebrated during Week 5. The theme for 2020 is "Always was, Always will be" which recognises that First Nations people have occupied and cared for this continent for over 65,000 years. It is an opportunity for all Australians to come together to celebrate the rich history, diverse cultures and achievements of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples as the oldest continuing cultures on the planet.

A variety of activities were conducted during lunch time, including traditional Aboriginal games, Aboriginal dance workshops, Aboriginal art activities and a flowering plant display where students learnt about the use of plants by Aboriginal people. The Aboriginal Cultural Roll Call group also sold NAIDOC cookies with the profits being donated to the Indigenous Literacy Foundation. The foundation develops and implements programs to encourage reading in Aboriginal communities. A large amount of students participated in these activities and it was great to see the school community coming together to celebrating NAIDOC week.

During the Wednesday school assembly Shay-Lee Evans and Juliette Kinny performed the acknowledgement to country whilst Tamika Watson-Ryan and Zelden Bell informed the students of the meaning and purpose of NAIDOC Week. The National Anthem was also performed in Dharawal language, the Aboriginal language of our area. Congratulations to these students who spoke confidently in front of the whole student body.

The week of celebrations were concluded with a pizza lunch for Aboriginal students, the Senior Executive Team and the Aboriginal Education Committee. A big thank you to the students in the roll call group and the teachers in the Aboriginal Education Committee for making the week a huge success!

ARCO REPORT

"If a tree falls in a forest and no one is around to hear it, does it make a sound?" When this thought experiment was examined by the Scientific American they came to the conclusion "no": Sound is vibration, transmitted to our senses through the mechanism of the ear, and recognised as sound only at our nerve centres. The falling of the tree or any other disturbance will produce vibration of the air. If there are no ears to hear, there will be no sound. Ok, enough science.

What if someone makes a racist comment and no one in the room is of that cultural background or ethnicity? Was the comment even racist? The answer is a resounding YES. There are still ears to hear, and those ears should be able to recognise an unacceptable comment. If you get the feeling that something is not quite right, it may be a sign that it's time to speak up and call it out for what it is: racism.

Appearances and names of many people of diverse backgrounds may seem somewhat ambiguous. People can try to guess and not even get within the same continent! This may result in inappropriate comments about a person's heritage. However, whether or not a culturally or linguistically diverse person is present is beside the point. These comments should not be made at a school, workplace, or any other public forum. If a person's idea of humour involves putting down another group of people, then they're not very funny at all!



But don't forget, it's important for everyone to continually reflect on experiences of unconscious bias and understand what true ally-ship and antiracism look like. The big one is simply speaking up when you see or hear injustice. This reflects one of Elderslie High's core PBL values: be responsible; be an upstander, not a bystander.

So, if a tree falls in the forest will you make a sound?

*Elderslie High's inaugural Multicultural Day will be held on Thursday 19th of November. The theme of the day is *Celebrate Unity, Embrace Diversity*. Students are encouraged to wear clothes that represent their heritage, whether that be traditional clothes, international sporting jerseys, colours of their flag, etc. They will participate in a range of engaging activities with the theme of respect for everyone who calls Australia home.

Remembrance Day – Armistice Day

The assembly was held on Wednesday the 11th of November to commemorate the end of the First World War. This year marks 102 years since the end of the Great War and was held to remember and pay tribute to all men and women, including Indigenous Australians, who fought and died not only WW1, but in all wars. We also acknowledge the 75th Anniversary of the end of WW2 in both Europe and particularly the Pacific region. Additionally, Week 5 aligned with NAIDOC week, to celebrate the history, culture and achievements of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples. Thank you to Shaylee Evans and Juliette Kinny (Year 7) who gave an Acknowledgement of Country, and Tamika Watson-Ryan (Year 9) and Zelden Bell (Year 7) who gave an explanation of what this year's NAIDOC message: Always Was, Always Will Be. The Australian National anthem containing the Dharawal and English verses, was played to reflect and show respect to our country.

"On the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month, 1918, the guns fell silent on the Western Front, after more than four years of continuous warfare. On this day, a minutes' silence is observed to remember the many servicemen and women who have sacrificed their lives in the pursuit of continued freedom for our nation, not just in the First World War, but all conflicts since. This year, we celebrate Remembrance Day during NAIDOC week. In our country's history, approximately 100,000 Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islanders have served in our armed forces, many of whom are ill recognised for their service and sacrifice. Today we pause to acknowledge, remember and honour them, alongside their other brothers and sisters in service. We pay our respects to their families and friends who have suffered such profound loss, and to the generations of their family left behind who carry their legacy into the future. May we never forget their sacrifice. We also take today to thank our current service men and women who continue to serve this nation proudly. Their commitment to duty and self-sacrifice for our bettering has helped to preserve our everyday freedoms that we continue to enjoy today.

Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people have served in every conflict and commitment involving Australian defence contingents since Federation, including both world wars and the intervals of peace since the Second World War. Aboriginal women played an important role in WW2. Many enlisted in the women's services or worked in war industries. In northern Australia Aboriginal and Islander women worked hard to support isolated RAAF outposts and even helped to salvage crashed aircraft. Indigenous personnel are known to have served in later conflicts and operations including in Somalia, East Timor, Afghanistan, Iraq, and on peacekeeping operations."

Marshall wore three medals in recognition of his uncle, Donald Kirkpatrick, enlisted in 1939 at Sydney, aged 17 years at the outbreak of World War II. He reached the rank of Leading Aircraftman in the Royal Australian Air Force, was attached to 93 Squadron Beaufighters and given the nicknames 'Titch' and 'Kirk'.



For his incredible World War II service, he was awarded these medals which Marshall wore proudly. The Pacific Star; for operational service in the Pacific of operations between 8 Dec 1941 – 2 Sept 1945, The War Medal; awarded for full time service in the Armed Forces between 3 Sept 1939 – 2 Sept 1945 and awarded to service until cessation of hostilities on 2 Sept 1945 and The Australian Service Medal; recognising the service of members of the Australian Armed Forces and the Australian Mercantile Marine during World War II. Its awarded to those that served at home or overseas for at least 18 months full time service or 3 years part time between 3 Sept 1945.

- Toys can't have dangers such as breakable glass, protrusions, or sharp edges
- We don't accept electrical, spark-producing toys because of fire regulations
- Glue or paint in craft kits must be non-toxic and non-flammable
- All DVDs need to be G or PG Rated

STYMIE – PARENT INFORMATION

Stymie helps combat the bystander effect by enabling students to report incidents of bullying and harm, safely and anonymously.

- The <u>bystander effect</u> occurs when the presence of others discourages an individual from intervening in an emergency situation.
- Social influence affects how bystanders behave, and students are less likely to stand up to bullying behaviours in public when the number of onlookers is high.
- This bystander effect is also caused by a diffusion of responsibility—the belief that someone else will help.

Taking into account that our kids are very socially invested, many of them don't feel as though they can speak up and often, they just don't know how. Rather than trying to work against this peer pressure, our solution recognises the nuanced nature of their social currency, by providing security and anonymity to the bystanding community.

Benefits for your child

- Fostering a safe environment Students make notifications about cyberbullying, bullying, illegal activity, depression, anxiety and self-harm. Reducing harm on all levels in schools makes for a safer learning space.
- Enabling early intervention The anonymous nature of Stymie means that students often make notifications early in the bullying cycle, enabling early intervention by the relevant contact at school.
- Alleviating anxiety and stress Encouraging bystanders to make notifications through Stymie can help reduce levels of anxiety associated with concealing stressful information.
- Encouraging pro-social behaviour Promoting a culture of care is important in all communities. Empowering students as the agents of change, means they have an opportunity to put their empathy into action.
- Providing a solution Stymie may point your child in the right direction if they have experienced or witnessed bullying or harm; a definitive course of action that may enable a life-changing conversation.
- Reducing distractions Experiencing or witnessing bullying and harm hinders your child's ability to learn. Being emotionally stressed, disengages their brain and takes them out of their learning. Making your school feel safer, means that your child can focus on their learning and on just 'being a kid'.



Stymie at your school

Any child at a Stymie-registered school can make a notification about someone they believe is being bullied or harmed. This notification is automatically forwarded to the school, and managed by the appropriate members of staff.

Everyone will benefit from the added safety that Stymie can provide—students, parents, educators and the wider community.
