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PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

Enrolment Policy

Following the release of the Department's new Enrolment Policy in Term 4 2019, Elderslie High School has now released its adjoining procedure document. This document provides advice to parents who may be considering an application for non-local enrolment to our school and stipulates the criteria that must be met for the school to consider any non-local enrolment. Interested parents can find the new Enrolment Procedures document on our website. To further support parents in their understanding of the changes, I have also included a copy of the Department's guide to the enrolment policy in this edition of Parent Bulletin.

On Tuesday, February 25 we hosted our annual Year 6 into Year 7 Information Evening to commence the process of familiarising our potential Year 7 cohort of 2021 with their future school environment. We would like to thank all the families who came along on the night. All families are reminded of the need to complete the Expression of Interest form for 2021 and return it to your primary school for processing by March 20. Please note, the outcome of these applications will not be announced until approximately June.

Student Successes

At Elderslie High School, we are always so blessed to have so many high achievers and we take a great deal of pride in supporting our students and their varied successes. On February 28, I was delighted to attend the Powerhouse Museum in Sydney to be with Year 12 student of 2019, Rocco Laria and his family for the opening of the SHAPE exhibition. SHAPE is an annual exhibition of the very best major projects from the HSC in the subjects of Design & Technology, Industrial Technology (Timber) and also in Textiles & Design. Rocco's work was one of only 35 works chosen from right across the state and was selected from 800 works that were shortlisted for this exhibition. Rocco developed a device that helps prevent wild animals from ending up as roadkill by detecting movement and using flashing lights to alert motorists. Featuring computer coding, Rocco's design was evaluated By Wollondilly Council and deemed to be so unique that it fell into its own niche market. Mrs Johnson, Head Teacher Technological & Applied Studies and I were honoured to be with Rocco for this special occasion. I have included some photographs for your reference.





We were also extremely pleased to see that our very own School Captain, Lachlan Taylor was selected to be one of only 120 Australian students to attend the National Schools Constitution Convention a little later in March. Lachlan will be travelling to Canberra for this event which will allow senior school students to explore Australia's constitution as a democratic framework while supporting them to learn more about government structures and operations. We look forward to hearing more about Lachlan's trip in the next edition of Parent Bulletin.

Financial Assistance

Elderslie High School is sometimes able to provide financial support to families for educational expenses. Our resources are finite, and we ask that any requests are put in writing to the principal for consideration.

From time to time, we also receive requests to hold fundraisers to provide financial support for students who may be taking on an elite level of participation in sport or creative and performing arts. While we are always excited to hear of these amazing opportunities that our students have been offered, our capacity to get behind any one individual student is limited. Since I commenced at Elderslie High School, I been astounded by the number of our students who represent at a state, national and even at an international level. There are simply dozens of students in all three of these categories and because of this sheer volume, we cannot run fundraisers for them all. In fact, to give readers of Parent Bulletin a rough idea, in 2019 we had approximately 40 students representing at state level in sport alone. Instead of providing personalised support, we run 4 mufti days per year, of which some proceeds are set aside to disperse amongst applicants by our Student Representative Council (SRC). We know that our fund raising only helps to a degree but we do encourage any interested families to apply to the SRC using the form available for this purpose. Any families who would like to do so should see Ms Mulligan in the HSIE faculty.

FROM THE DEPUTY PRINCIPALS

Jennifer Villanueva (DP Years 8 & 11) Departure from school

Late in 2019, the school initiated a structured process for the departure of all students from our school grounds of an afternoon. This process was designed to ensure the increased safety of our students as they exit the school and embark on their journey home.

Students catching buses, are expected to remain in the supervised, lower COLA area until their bus is called over the loud speaker system. When their bus is called, they move towards the bus bay and line up at the teacher on duty. With their Opal cards in hand, students are then led by the teacher on duty to ascend the bus, one at a time in a safe and respectful manner.

Students who walk home, will move directly through the gate near the Basketball courts or the front school gate depending upon which direction they live. They will not loiter around the school and will move of in a settled manner.

Students waiting to be picked up will remain inside the front school gates, under the direct supervision of a staff member. No student should sit on the retaining wall at the front of the school or loiter out the front waiting to be picked up. There is no supervision along the front of the school and we have a duty of care to supervise all students until they embark on their journey home. If your child is in need of support in the afternoon, please remember that there are staff members at the COLA, bus bay and inside the front gate who are willing and able to help your child.

Anti-Racism Contact Officer

I would like to welcome Ms Woo, who has been appointed as Elderslie High School's second ARCO, working alongside Ms Jan. Both of these capable staff members are Science teachers and may be found in the Science Staffroom during breaks, should students want to talk to them.

In line with NSW DoE policy, all forms of racism are unacceptable at Elderslie High School. No student, employee, parent, caregiver or community member should experience racism, including direct or indirect harassment within the learning and working environments of the department. A member of staff in all public schools must undergo training to become the school's ARCO (Anti-Racism Contact Officer).

The ARCO's role has four main aspects as follows: mediator role, procedural role, educational role and monitoring role.

Most importantly, Elderslie High School staff will continue to promote acceptance of and respect for Australia's cultural, linguistic and religious diversity. Anti-racism education is taught in our classrooms directly and indirectly and we make every effort to ensure our school is free from discrimination. It is the Anti-Racism Contact Officer's role to support staff, students and any member of the school community who wishes to raise a complaint of racism or just talk about their experiences of racism as a target or bystander.

Year 11 Review Panel meetings

This week Ms Le and I started conducting Review Panel meetings with the students of Year 11 who need to improve in certain areas. We interviewed these students and outlined the areas in which they are in jeopardy of not meeting course requirements. Students were given a detailed sheet of what needs to be completed and must see their teachers to have this sheet signed off and returned to me once the task is resolved. Areas for which students have been reviewed are – those who have received N Warning notifications; those not working with diligence and sustained effort; those who have not completed course components (e.g. in class booklets), including non-completion of classwork due to lack of attendance and those with multiple negative behaviours, as referred by staff which result in lower learning outcomes for themselves and others.

Students were reminded that it is a requirement that they complete all assessment tasks to the best of their ability; they must also work in class with diligence and sustained effort, adequately covering the course content. If students do not do this, they are in jeopardy of receiving an N Warning, which means a warning of Non Completion of the course. If two N Warnings are issued for any one subject, the student may be N Determined in that subject. Please refer to my January Deputy Principal's Report for more comprehensive information on N Determinations.

I will be making phone calls to discuss these concerns with all parents of students who have (or are soon to be) reviewed.

Year 12

In the meetings we clearly communicate to the students the N-Warnings they have received and we go over the work that is required to be completed in order for the N-Warning to be cleared. In addition to this we provide support by helping the students to plan their time effectively and we offer assistance to the student if it is needed. I then rang all of the parents so that we can continue to work together so that the children at risk have every opportunity to meet HSC requirements. I will repeat this process again in Term 2 and 3.

Valentine's Day

Valentine's Day fell on Friday this year and our Year 12 students were prepared for this annual fundraiser. Students from any year group can purchase roses or songs for people they care about at school. During roll call on the day, Year 12 students deliver the songs and roses to the recipients. It is an absolute delight to see our Year 12 students dressed up and singing love songs with no inhibitions. This event is unique to Elderslie High School and it certainly spreads a message of positivity throughout the school.

Year 10 – End of Year Function

Day of Action Against Bullying

The National Day of Action against Bullying and Violence, is an opportunity for Australian schools to highlight their everyday work to counter bullying and violence. Year 7 and 9 – NAPLAN Online 2020

Our school has been selected to conduct NAPLAN Online for 2020 between Tuesday 12 May and Friday 22 May. There are four tests that include Writing, Reading, Conventions of Language and Numeracy. As preparation for the online test, our school will be conducting a 45minute practice test for all Years 7 and 9 students towards the end of this term. This activity will provide an opportunity for every student to experience the NAPLAN online assessment platform as well as the functionality and tools within the locked down browser. It will also provide students with an opportunity to become familiar with the types of questions they will experience in NAPLAN Online.

Message from the ARCO: What's In a Name?

What's in a name? That which we call a rose, by any other name would smell as sweet.

Shakespeare fans will recognise this quote from Romeo and Juliet. Deeply in love with Romeo, Juliet is in despair because of her family's rivalry with Romeo's family. His name isn't relevant; she would still love him if he had another name. As romantic as that idea is, it suggests that names themselves do not hold worth nor meaning, and they simply act as labels to distinguish one person from another. But our names do hold meaning. Whether it be the name of an ancestor, have cultural significance, or represent our country of heritage. Our parents *chose* our name for us. They *know* how they want their child's name to be pronounced. However this is Australia, and sometimes it can be hard to produce a sound unfamiliar to the Australian accent. Some people (and I'm one of them!) choose to anglicise their name for those outside their linguistic heritage. Sometimes it's just easier to tweak a few consonants and vowels than have to explain and go through the frustration of repeating yourself to get the correct pronunciation.

Other people may just quietly accept the pronunciation someone may proffer. But how many Siobhan's, Ciaran's, Eoin's, or Seamus's stay silent if their name is mispronounced? People of language backgrounds other than English should also not be embarrassed to set the record straight and let others know how their name should be pronounced.

There are others (and I absolutely applaud them!) that will insist on the correct pronunciation of their name. When he made his appearance on 'Ellen', Hasan Minhaj openly corrected her pronunciation of his name. Later when he was questioned about it, Hasan explained he did it because he saw his mother cringe in the audience (though his father told him to let it go because it's Ellen DeGeneres!). I'm often reminded of the quote by US actress Uzo Aduba's mother when, as a child, Uzo asked her mother if she could change her name to Zoe: "If they can learn to say Tchaikovsky and Michelangelo and Dostoyevsky, they can learn to say Uzoamaka".

As teachers, we never want our students to feel ashamed or embarrassed about their name. All students are valued and we all do our best to say names in a manner that promotes respect. If a mispronunciation occurs please have a quiet word in our ear and let us know!

CAREERS REPORT

We have many activities organised for Years 10 to 12 students in Careers. Our industry visits have started for Year 11 and 12 students with some fantastic opportunities happening in the upcoming holidays. Design and Textiles students have an amazing opportunity to take their major works to a free workshop in Sydney CBD to get industry assistance and critique to help students get a good head start on their major works assessment which are worth 70% of their HSC component. There is also an extraordinary opportunity for students interested in sports management to spend time with top managers for Western Sydney Wanderers and Greater Western Sydney Giants to spend a day in the life with them and gain valuable insight into this career path. Business Studies students will have an opportunity to spend time



with Naomi Simpson, creator or Red Balloon to learn more about entrepreneurial experiences. All these workshops will be available for registration soon, it is important students have regular access to their school emails.

Year 10 will have the opportunity in June to attend the MACE careers expo. This will be at Menangle Park Raceway and will be at a cost of \$5 for students. We will have a maximum of 100 places, so it is important that students return their notes and pay the money at the office as soon as possible to secure their position. This is a wonderful opportunity for our students to start looking into their career pathways and start asking questions to industry experts and allow them to have a good idea of what subjects they will choose for their Higher School Certificate starting in 2021. It will also be a good opportunity for students thinking of leaving school to talk to TAFE and trade schools about what is involved in those pathways.

University open days should be uploaded onto the Careers website shortly. This will also be emailed to students in Year 12 as information becomes available along with early entry dates. In the meantime, it is important students start working on their resume or keeping track of their extracurricular activities which may assist them in their early entry process. It is also a good idea to check the University guides to make sure the university offers the course they wish to seek early entry for as not all universities offer all courses. It is always good to have plan B, C and D ready for when UAC opens at the beginning of August.

Information for parents

The Enrolment of Students in NSW Government Schools policy is in place to assist schools to meet their obligations under the *Education Act 1990* - to ensure that every student has a place at their local school. The policy also communicates to staff and the community a transparent enrolment process.

Why was the enrolment policy revised?

Across the state, many communities are changing. Some are growing at rates never seen before. Some schools that used to be able to accept out-of-area enrolments, no longer have the room to do so.

The revised policy is designed to support schools to manage all enrolment applications, encourage greater consistency in decision-making and make sure the enrolment choices are clear for parents.

What are the changes?

The enrolment cap

The enrolment cap is the number of students that can be enrolled at a school based on the school's permanent accommodation. The enrolment cap tells us whether the school may or may not have the capacity to accept nonlocal enrolments. It is not a target or limit on the number of local enrolments a school can take.

Each school with a local intake area will have a cap set by the department from Term 4 2019.

Within the enrolment cap, a number of enrolment places (the buffer) must be kept aside for the likely number of local students who will need to enrol during the year. For this reason, a school will not take non-local students once they reach their buffer, unless there are exceptional circumstances.

100-point residential address check

Parents planning to enrol their child at a school that is near or at its buffer or cap will be asked to complete the 100-point residential address check to confirm they live within the school's designated intake area. This means parents will need to provide documents to verify the child's current address.

So that schools only seek information relevant to the child's enrolment, a list of approved documents for the residential address check is available from the school or the department's website at <u>https://education.nsw.gov.</u> <u>au/policy-library/policies/enrolment-of-students-in-nsw-</u> <u>government-schools</u>.

Selection criteria for non-local enrolment

Sibling enrolments are now clearly prioritised (where possible) and selection criteria for non-local enrolment will not include student ability, performance or achievement.

What has not changed?

Schools will continue to enrol students who live in their local intake area, regardless of the school's cap status.

Enrolment procedures for students accessing particular education settings (for example selective schools, distance education, specialist support classes for students with disability, Intensive English Centres) are not affected by the revised policy.

In schools with available places, there are no changes to enrolment rights of siblings of non-local students. Each enrolment application is considered on its merits, including if siblings currently attend the school. If the school is below capacity, out-of-area applications for siblings of current students will be given enrolment priority.

Schools will continue to provide families with support and advice during the enrolment process, including assessment of exceptional and compelling circumstances particularly for vulnerable students and their families. Schools will also continue to apply the policy fairly and consistently using transparent and accountable processes when making decisions about enrolment applications. Parents have a right of appeal to determine whether the stated processes have been applied in a procedurally

But what do the changes mean for me?

fair manner.

What if my child is already enrolled but we do not live in that school's intake area?

Your child will remain enrolled at the school as the revised policy does not affect students already enrolled in NSW Covernment schools.

We were in area when my child was enrolled in the school. The department has since changed the school's boundary and our residence is now out of area. I have other children and I want them all to go to the same school. What are my options?

At times it is necessary for the department to make adjustments to a school's local enrolment intake area. This could mean a family with a child/children already enrolled is then outside the local intake area. When this happens, the family will still be able to enrol siblings together at the school, regardless of whether the school is over the buffer or cap.

I already have a child enrolled as an out-of-area student in a NSW Government school. Can I enrol my other children at that school too?

This will depend on the capacity of the school:

- If the school is not near its buffer, then siblings should be able to be enrolled at the school. In fact, siblings of students currently enrolled will be prioritised, where possible, over other non-local enrolment applications.
- If the school is nearing its buffer, then the school will form a non-local enrolment panel. The panel considers non-local enrolment applications when the number of non-local applications received exceeds the number of places available below the buffer. Again, in this instance, siblings of students currently enrolled will be prioritised, where possible, over other non-local enrolment applications.
- If the school is at capacity, it will not accept non-local enrolment applications unless there are exceptional circumstances.

I have already accepted an offer for my child to attend a school in 2020 that is not my local school. What happens now?

The enrolment will proceed. Non-local enrolments accepted before Term 4 2019 for students starting in 2020 should not be affected.

What is the criteria for enrolment in a school that is not my local school?

Schools that are able to accept non-local enrolment applications establish a non-local enrolment selection panel, if demand exceeds the number of places below the school's buffer.

Schools are required to make the selection criteria available to the school community.

My circumstances are challenging and I think this school is best for my child. We live outside the school's intake area. What should I do?

We understand that not everyone's circumstances are the same, and that there are instances where exceptional and compelling circumstances will need to be considered. If this is the case, you should talk to the principal of your local school.
