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PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

Life is Busy at EHS!

Despite significant student and staff illness this term so far, it's been a jam-packed term filled with lots of learning, sporting opportunities and wellbeing initiatives. From my end, I really enjoyed watching a group of our Year 10 boys participating in training with the West Tigers community outreach program. The boys were extremely respectful in both their theory and football related training, which was a pleasure to see.

We held a very successful Cross Country Carnival on May 18 at Kirkham Oval. In addition to the long-distance route, there was a lovely atmosphere created through the novelty events including the sack race, three legged race and tug of war. The weather was finally kind to us and a great day was had by all.

Finally, NAPLAN was completed by all Year 7 and 9 students. As most parents would be aware, NAPLAN has now moved online and we eagerly await the results to support our staff in making the most appropriate plans to inform the cycle of teaching and learning. I would like to thank Mr White, Mr Sambuco and Ms Wilson for all their efforts in administering NAPLAN this year.

School Infrastructure Projects

I am excited to announce that we are about to commence a renovation of the school's back carpark and entrance to the Support Unit. This area of the school has long been in a poor state of repair and recent rain has created significant upheaval to the area. Schools Infrastructure NSW is funding a project to improve the area which will make a significant improvement to the safe access of our Support Unit students to their classrooms. The project will also improve general drainage around the Agriculture plot and seal the surface in front of the school's main poultry enclosures which have been very muddy underfoot throughout these last few months. There will be some interruptions during the construction phase but we look forward to another improvement to the school campus to couple with the last few major renovations we have conducted including the kitchens, The Grove playground and the school entry. As you can imagine, maintaining a school campus that is almost 50 years old is a major task! I would like to thank Mrs Russell, our Business Manager for all her work in assisting me with this project. The work should be done this term, just as soon as the ground dries out sufficiently.

Another area that is often under scrutiny is the long driveway alongside the COLA, basketball court and back oval. This driveway borders our school and also Hilder Oval – a council

oval often used for community sport. Whilst the driveway is on our property, we see frequent degradation through shared use by both the general public as well as students and staff. Again, during the recent rain, the driveway has acquired even more potholes. I would like to advise our school community that while we are seeking a solution to this matter, our funding does not always stretch far enough to improve all parts of our grounds to our satisfaction and we do the best we can in this area. The area is not, and has never been, an assigned student carpark and students who park there do so at their own risk. We will continue to seek an appropriate solution in the future.

Mr Sambuco has provided significant support to Year 9 and 12 over this extended period of time and now that Mrs Amos is back, we would like to extend our thanks to him. FROM THE DEPUTY PRINCIPALS

Natalie Martin (DP Years 8 & 11)

Year 8

On Thursday 23rd June, the school will be holding a subject selection assembly in preparation for students to choose their electives in 2023. At the assembly, students will have the opportunity to learn about the different courses that the school offers to help them to make an informed decision. We will issue each student with a booklet to take home and discuss their subject choices with parents. All students will receive an email with a link to make their choices online. It is

very important that students are given appropriate guidance as the elective courses will run across both Year 9 and 10. There is a small window of time that we allow for subject changes at the beginning of 2023.

Year 11

Year 11 are completing their second assessment period in Weeks 6, 7 and 8 this term. Many students will be quite stressed during this time and may be required to complete take home assignments or in class examinations. The best way to alleviate stress from an increase in workload is to ensure that students are getting adequate sleep and allocating time each day to complete schoolwork. If any students need assistance with completing assessments, they can access support from Miss Lysaught our librarian or Mrs Wilson our Head Teacher of Secondary Studies.

Semester 1 school reports were issued on Friday 3rd June at the conclusion of the Recognition Assembly. Thank you to Mr Mani and Ms Bun for coordinating the assembly and the awards.

Uniform

Students are able to wear the new tracksuit pants with any item of uniform. This has been quite a popular decision for our students who are now looking much better during the cooler months. We consulted with students and chose a design that was liked by a cross section of students from Years 7-12. Our aim is to discourage students from wearing non-uniform tracksuit pants as we have provided a good alternative. Another issue is that many student wear hoodies to school under their school jacket. If students are cold, we recommend that students layer the school sloppy joe underneath the jacket, which should provide adequate warmth in the playground during the winter months. If parents are experiencing financial difficulty, they can approach the school for assistance with purchasing school uniform items.

Year 7

Congratulations to the students of Year 7 for completing their final NAPLAN testing. This year we completed the tests through an online platform which would have been a first for our students. This presented the students with a whole new set of skills to master and their patience with any of the technical difficulties the platform presented was commendable. It was pleasing to see that many students were able to demonstrate their best effort when completing their assessments for Reading, Writing, Conventions of Language and Numeracy. It is great to practice the skill of concentration and focus for the many years of formal testing still to come in their schooling and for many students, this is invaluable. We are looking forward to seeing how your child has grown with their learning and their test results are released later in the

year. We also use this data to assist our staff in recognising your child's strengths and weaknesses in the basic components of literacy and numeracy they will need for work and life in the future. Whilst the NAPLAN testing is important for schools it is also handy to remember that NAPLAN does not assess everything. Personal skills like creativity, resilience, curiosity and kindness are valued in society and for the jobs of the future. These skills are just as important as the learning assessed in NAPLAN so please discuss with your child and assist them in developing in these areas so can they can remain focused at school and engaged for the future.

We will continue to support our students through the COVID Intensive Learning Support Program and it has been pleasing to hear that some of our Year 7 students have been able to engage with our 2 expert teachers. The growth in their learning will be invaluable for the future and I encourage them to continue the techniques learnt to keep learning everyday.

On a day to day basis, please discuss with your child the importance of listening and following instructions. We are seeing an increase with some students forgetting these valuable skills at school. The ability to follow instructions to work with others is a home, workplace and life skill and during these challenging teenage years, surrounded by friends and peers the rules can be forgotten. Once again, we are persistently hearing of negative interactions between some students online. Please monitor and manage your child's online behaviour and limit where necessary. This will assist you over the next couple of challenging years as your child progresses through early adolescence.

The Year 7 camp is almost upon us also. This has been rescheduled from the start of the year. It is taking place in the first week of Term 3, July 20th-22nd. Details have already been emailed and sent home with your child. Please ensure all finalised payments are made by the end of Week 6 to the front office. Year 10

Year 10 students have been working hard to complete their ongoing classwork and assessment tasks. The first round of student reviews is under way. This will involve students who have not completed their assessment tasks therefore putting their progress towards their ROSA in jeopardy. Please maintain your support of your child's education and promote the completion of any outstanding task.

Our subject selection process will begin towards the end of term 2. Please schedule for your diaries the night of Monday June 27 as our Parent Information Evening. Further details will be released closer to the date. This event will be essential in ensuring your child makes the right choices for the senior years of high school. You will get the opportunity to speak with faculty Head Teachers about the courses on offer and their requirements.

We have been continually successful in achieving workplace apprenticeships or traineeships for our students this year. An

increasing number of students have been success in moving towards the world of work in a career that is linked to their interest and desire as an apprenticeship or traineeship. It's been very exciting and satisfying to hear of the enthusiasm these students now have towards their learning and future skills. Student Designed Shirts

First Nation Students received the much awaited shirts they designed with local artist Michael Fardon. The students did a great job and really enjoyed the experience. They look great!!!

The design tells a story based around the school and local area. The Lyrebird, which is the totem of the Dharawal people, is silhouetted on the back, standing proud and strong just like the students at Elderslie HS. The background design covering the shirt are campfire symbols that connect to show how we are connected to each other, the land, families, and other schools. They are then highlighted within the side panels and sleeves along with Lyrebird tracks to show a journey that we take together with the Dharawal people and reconciliation. The handprints on the front of the shirt each represent a year group from Year 7 through to Year 12.

The chevron 'V' which is an icon symbol when it comes to many sporting teams which was original adapted from wartime uniforms.

The boomerang with campfire symbols also represents the six year groups including staff. The meeting place symbol represents the students, coming together, working as a team, attending EHS with pride.

Sorry Day

We reflect on the mistreatment of First Nations people, in particular the Stolen Generations, and the profound grief, suffering and loss they have experienced.

Reconciliation Week

Reconciliation is about strengthening relationships between First Nations people and non-Indigenous people, for the benefit of all Australians. A reconciled Australia is one where

the rights of First Nations people are not just respected but championed in all the places that matter.

The theme for Reconciliation Week 2022 is “Be Brave. Make Change.” It is a challenge to all Australians— individuals, families, communities, organisations and the government—to *Be Brave* and tackle reconciliation so we can *Make Change* for the benefit of all Australians.

Last year Reconciliation Australia encouraged all Australians to take action, not just in Reconciliation Week but every week of the year.

This year everyone is asked to make change beginning with brave actions in their daily lives – where they live, work, play and socialise.
