School Events

Since our last edition of Parent Bulletin, our school has held a raft of special events and staged a million extra-curricular opportunities for our students. I am super proud of our student leaders in both our Captaincy Team and our Prefect Body who have worked tirelessly to initiate, plan, consult and implement ideas that are close to their hearts. In late Term 3, our 2023 Captaincy Team held a wonderful Trivia Night for Year 12 students, their parents and the staff. It was a wonderful night that mixed together mind challenges, fun and lots of laughs and an opportunity for families to get to know our staff and each other. Our Year 11 students are about to stage "Wish Day" in support of the Starlight Foundation. The student leaders planning this special day have sought raffle prizes and special guests and planned lunchtime activities to raise funds for this important charity. We have had Mental Health month and also a series of activities to support positive body image. It has been a joy to work with these highly motivated students as they seek to make a difference.

Our Year 11 Prefect team had the opportunity to run for the 2024 Captaincy Team late last term. To be selected, students needed to have served as prefects first. Following elections and interviews, eight amazing young people rose to the top. Our 2024 School Captains were announced to be Emma Evans and Caterina Weber with our Vice Captains being Noah Douglas, Joshua Charlton, Xavier Laundess, Jasper Browne, Angelina Buakao and Carlee Bell. In late Term 3, we celebrated Wear It Purple Day, in which students were invited to wear a purple accessory to celebrate and raise awareness of our LGBTQI+ community. At Elderslie High School, we recognise our diverse student body and the value of being supportive of all students.

On September 8, I attended a ceremony at Caroline Chisholm College in Glenmore Park to see the culmination of the Greater Sydney Schools Cattle Competition. Many of our Agriculture students attended this celebration in which our school competed for the first time in an event that allows school teams to rear a steer over a given period before it is judged. The students in the team are also judged for their skills in parading and husbandry, amongst other key skills. We were one of only three public schools to do so and so I was delighted to see that our school finished third overall. The competition organisers highlighted our success as remarkable in our inaugural year.

Finally, the highlight of Term 3 was the beautiful Year 12 Graduation Ceremony in which our Class of 2023 celebrated the culmination of thirteen years of school. It was wonderful to celebrate with our students and their families and look back on the memories whilst thinking of the exciting chapter that awaits. At the time of writing, our Class of 2023 have already commenced the HSC examinations and we wish them all the very best in their endeavours.

Morning Arrival and Gate Locking

A reminder that the warning bell rings in the morning at 8.45am. By 8.50am, students should be in Roll Call where the official school roll for the day is taken. Recently, I have noticed a number of students walking in after the roll call bell has sounded. The General Assistant locks all our security gates at 9am and latecomers are required to buzz in through the main pedestrian gate. If students are walking to school and attempt to enter via the gate closest to Hilder Oval, which is around the back of the school, they will find that the gate is locked and they will be required to walk around to Hilder St.

Clearance and Student Assistance

At this time of year, our students are competing clearance in terms of returning any school property that they might have. We ask for parental support in locating any textbooks, novels and other school items so that we can use this for the next year group. Invoices are also sent to families for voluntary and subject contributions. A reminder that we are always happy to help families out financially if there is a need. Parents are asked to write to me directly so that we can support you. Such queries are always handled with discretion. If families need support with uniforms, please indicate this in your letter or email as well.

FROM THE DEPUTY PRINCIPALS

Mobile Phones

Elderslie High School has been implementing the YONDR Pouch Mobile Phone management system since the beginning of Term 2 this year. This has had a significant impact on student concentration and learning in the classroom. Additionally, there has been less incidents arising from inappropriate use of mobile phones both in classrooms and in the playground.

You may be aware that the NSW Government have banned the use of mobile phones across all public high schools in NSW from the beginning of this term. This means that all students must have their mobile phones turned off and out of site. The ban is one measure the NSW Government has put in place to improve classroom environments and learning outcomes.

The school appreciates parent support with encouraging their children to keep mobile phones off and within the YONDR pouch throughout each school day. This ongoing support will assist with building an effective and safe learning environment for all students.

Year 9

Year 9 students have their final examinations and assessment tasks for 2023 during Weeks 4 and 5 of this term. They will be issued with an examination timetable at the beginning of Week 3 of this term. In addition to the yearly examinations, students in Year 9 are required to complete another Numeracy and Literacy test which is referred to as Check In Assessment. Check In Assessment will take place in the library during week 6 of Term 4. Students will need to bring their own wired earphones for this test. Specific dates and times of this testing will be communicated to parents and students via email and Google Classroom.

The Year 9 Recognition Assembly will occur in the final week of school this term. At this assembly students are recognised for academic effort, attendance, merit and good behaviour. Whilst most students receive an award, there will be several students who will not be awarded a certificate. Students who do not receive an award can improve their effort, attendance and behaviour for recognition in 2024.

Students may wish to represent the school for various opportunities that may arise throughout the year. To be permitted to represent the school students must have good attendance and behaviour throughout the year. This includes wearing the school uniform.

Year 12

Year 12 students participated in their Graduation Ceremony and Picnic Day at the end of last term. Both of these events went extremely well, and it was a privilege to join in with their final week of celebrations. Year 12 students are now nearing the end of their HSC examinations. We have arranged for students to bring in their clearance forms, return books and pay outstanding fees on Friday 3rd November. Then they

have their Formal at Panorama House on Thursday 16th November. The final school event will be the morning tea to celebrate HSC and ATAR results on Friday 15th December. Information about this will be posted to the Google Classroom and on the school Facebook page.

Vear 7

Coming up in the next few weeks will be our final Check In assessments for Year 7 students. These online assessments give our teachers an indication of the learning growth your child has made this year. While these results are not published to parents, please encourage your child to participate to the best of their ability so we know how far they have come this year and how to prepare for 2024 when your child is in Year 8.

Year 10 Yearly Examinations

End of Year Examinations are being held during Weeks 3 and 4 and all students have been issued a copy of the examination timetable. Students are reminded that if they are absent from any assessment, they need to provide documentation to explain their absence and complete an Illness/Misadventure Form. If students are aware they will miss an examination in advance, they must inform the relevant Head Teacher so that an alternative can be organised. I encourage Year 10 to strive to achieve their personal best, complete tasks by their due dates and finish their courses to the best of their ability.

Resolving Tasks for N Warning Letters

Students who have not resolved N Warning letters by submitting tasks and working with diligence and sustained effort, unfortunately may not meet requirements and gain their Year 10 RoSA. In Week 1 of this term, some Year 10 students were given a letter to remind them of the subjects that still require work to be submitted. Mrs Lawrence and myself will be conducting N Determination interviews with students and their parents in the near future.

Transition Program

Our transition to the senior years will begin in Week 7 this term. At this time, all Year 10 students will start experiencing the subjects they chose for 2024-2025. Students will be informed of their successful subjects shortly. During the transition program students will not officially begin the Year 11 curriculum but ensure they understand and have the necessary skills required for a successful start to Year 11 by undertaking activities to improve their study skills and understanding of senior course requirements. We know our students benefit immensely from the opportunity and very much look forward to becoming a senior student. For those students who may be are seeking opportunities to take up apprenticeships or traineeships next year, they may like to engage in work experience during the transition program.



Students and parents should reach out to Mrs Whitfield for details on the process of work experience and other employment ready opportunities that may be available.

End of Year Function

The Year 10 event is planned for Thursday, 30 November at Camden Lakeside. Students and parents are reminded that invitations to the event are based upon the students having met good standards of attendance, behaviour and application to schoolwork during the year. Details about the event have been communicated to students and parents.

Check In Assessment – Year 7, 8 and 9

During Week 6 and 7 of this term, all students in Year 7, 8 and 9 will participate in the Check-in assessment. The Check-in assessment is an NSW Department of Education online literacy and numeracy assessment available to support schools to assess and monitor student learning.

The assessment is used to supplement existing school practices to identify how students are performing in literacy and numeracy and to help teachers tailor their teaching more specifically to student needs.

Details regarding the dates students will complete the assessments will be sent home shortly.

Students will be asked to bring headphones or earbuds that plug into a computer to enable them to hear audio during the assessment. Earbuds used for mobile phones or other portable devices are not suitable for use during the assessment.

Science

Year 8 Students – VALID

Students in Year 8 during Week 3 & 4, Term 4 will be undergoing a VALID (Validation of Assessment for Learning & Individual Development) test for Science. The multimedia test takes approximately 75 minutes and will be based on Stage 4 (Years 7 & 8) outcomes and essential content from the Science syllabus.

A hard copy of test notification will be sent home via your child but is also published in this parent bulletin.

Students are required to bring earphones with a round pin to listen to content. If your child has a disability that needs special consideration or has been educated in English for less than one year, please contact me to discuss special provisions or exemption from the test.



Results of the VALID tests will be available to parents in Term 1, 2024.

Library Matters

A big deal was made in the media about this year's NAPLAN results. Studies show that results improve when schools and families work together to support their child's learning, and while it can seem overwhelming at times knowing how to support your child at home, the good news is that there is a very simple way to improve their reading skills: by reading!

Dr Bronwyn Reddan is currently conducting research into teen reading habits, and she has recently published some interesting insights about what stops them reading and what keeps them reading. The main barriers to reading in adolescence are: 1) Time; 2) Identity; 3) Attention; 4) Motivation; and 5) Supply. If you'd like to read more of Dr Reddan's research, you can access it here: https://australiareads.org.au/news/bronwyn-reddan-teen-reading/

Reddan notes, "if we want more teens to read for pleasure, teens need to see reading as an important and valuable activity." Parents can be important reading role models for teens, with Reddan showing that fathers hold particular influence. Showing your child that reading is valuable by providing time to read, access to books, and by reading yourself can be another key strategy which supports our work at school, with the ultimate aim of improving our students' skills and confidence.

However, books can be expensive and, with the cost of living increasing, buying new books to read may be difficult. Public libraries can be an invaluable resource for providing free texts to support your child's literacy, and many offer free physical and digital books via their websites. Elderslie High School also provides free ebooks and audiobooks to supplement our library's physical collection, which your child can access 24/7 using their school email.



The Greater Sydney Schools Cattle Competition involves eleven schools rearing a Murray Grey steer for 100 days. Ms Last guided the Cattle Team, Charley Buckley, Zara Buckley, Joshua Charlton, Will Giles, Annabelle Kormos, Audrey Morrison, Rylee Schaefer and Lucy Tucker through this competition. It is made up of a range of components including the judging of the steer itself as well as students competing in parading competitions, junior judging and herdsmanship where students present information about the rearing of the animal. Results from each of these competitions are combined and the Elderslie Team were awarded 1st Place for Herdsmanship, Rylee was awarded Champion Senior Novice Parader and the combined results for all of the sections led to being placed 3rd overall.




Senior members of our Alpaca Team, Sophie Constantine, Tanneah McMartin, Isabella Robbins and Georgie Todd were sponsored by our mentor stud, Storybook Alpacas, to travel to Victoria to represent NSW in the National Alpaca Show. Hannah Stootman also attended the show with the Jackpot Alpaca Stud. The students had a fantastic weekend competing in Showmanship and Stockmanship competitions as well as Junior Judging and came home with a vast array of ribbons. Then, a few weeks later, the junior and senior members of the team travelled to Goulburn where they entered the Charles Ledger Alpaca Show Pairs Challenge in Stockmanship and Showmanship and took out the top 4 places in the competition.



Penrith Show is always a major event on our calendar where we compete with 13 schools in a range of competitions. Each school prepares a display on a different agricultural theme and students are interviewed by a team of 3 judges. This year our display was about soil, starting with its composition and leading through to the wide array of products that we get from it. A large team of students spent many hours during breaks and after school constructing components of the display and then manned the display for the weekend. There was much excitement when we were awarded 1st place by the judges as well as 1st Place for the Students Choice Award for our display. Another competition involved preparing two calves, provided by Leppington Pastoral Company, which we received at the beginning of Term 2. The Cattle Team fed and trained these calves in preparation for the big day where one was awarded Champion Steer. Several members of the team also entered the Paraders Competition with all of our students winning a ribbon and Charley Buckley taking out Champion Novice Parader. On the Sunday of the Show, junior members of the Alpaca Team took part in Alpaca Showmanship with Charlie Gregory being awarded the Reserve Champion trophy. We also won the Trophy for our "Other Livestock" which were entered in 5 different competitions. It was a pleasure to spend the weekend with all of the students involved in various aspects of the competition and see them interacting with the public in such a positive way. 

Dear Year 8 Parent or Carer

The Validation of Assessment for Learning & Individual Development (VALID) test for Year 8 students will be held between Monday 23 October and Friday 3 November 2023. The test takes approximately 75 minutes. The VALID Science 8 test is an interactive, multimedia test completed entirely on a computer.

VALID Science 8 contains multiple choice, short response and extended response tasks that are grouped around real-world issues, including scientific investigations. This is a diagnostic test, with tasks framed on Stage 4 outcomes and essential content in the NSW Science Years 7–10 Syllabus (2018). Students will be tested on their:

- knowledge and understanding of science
- · understanding and skills in the process of scientific investigation
- · ability to evaluate evidence, make judgements and think critically
- ability to access information and communicate scientific ideas.

Students also complete a survey about their opinions, attitudes, and values about science.

VALID Science 8 contains audio, so each student needs to bring suitable **headphones** or earbuds that connect to a device. Schools will indicate if students need their own device.

If your child has a disability that needs special consideration or has been educated in English for less than one year, please contact your child's school to discuss special provisions or exemption from the test.

Results of the test will be available during Term 1, 2024. Information about each student is treated confidentially and held securely to ensure that the right to privacy of all students is maintained. A personalised electronic report describing the knowledge and skills demonstrated by your child in the test will be available from their school. There will also be information about how your child's results compare with overall performance of all students in the test across NSW.

The principal of your child's school can provide you with more details about the VALID program if you require additional information.

Grow Your Own: Local Teacher Pipeline

The Grow Your Own: Local Teacher Pipeline program supports up to 75 local people in Dubbo and surrounds, Queanbeyan, the Murray region, and Western and South-Western Sydney to kick start their teaching career in a NSW secondary public school.

There are three entry pathways:

Undergraduate (4 years FT)
