PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

Term 2 is always a busy time in schools with a range of assessment tasks being conducted and staff busily preparing feedback for our students, much of which will underpin Semester 1 reports. Despite the normality of school life at this time, we have had so much to celebrate.

Top of the list has been our 2023 school musical, "Strictly Ballroom". I cannot rave enough about the hard work of our Creative and Performing Arts faculty who have worked so hard to give our students the opportunity to participate in such an incredible showcase of talent. To see the pride and joy on the faces of the students was so heart warming. They displayed courage, strength, commitment and teamwork and this can be said of all students who were involved from the cast to the Event Management Team who organised sound, lighting and props across the 5 performances of the show. It was wonderful to welcome students from our partner primary schools who were able to visit to watch the dress rehearsal before opening night. It was also fantastic to see so many ex-students who were invited to be involved as members of the EHS Alumni. These former students assisted with sound, choreography and student mentorship and one former school captain even took on a role in the show. I couldn't have been more proud of our students.

This term has also seen the new Elderslie High School houses take full flight with the election of House Captains and Vice Captains. This has added a new layer of leadership opportunities within our school and is creating a lovely buzz of excitement as students vie for house points within the school day and also at key events like our carnivals.

Student Successes

I would like to single out a couple of specific examples of student success this term. In addition, we have recently been notified of the success of Kimberley Smith of Year 10 who has been offered a place in the 2023 NSW Public Schools Aboriginal Dance Company. This is a prestigious offer for Kimberley who will work with choreographers from the Bangarra Dance Theatre and



prepare a piece to be performed at the Dance Festival and School Spectacular. What a wonderful honour this is for Kimberley. We are also very proud of Ella Smith, also of Year 10 who, following her audition, has been identified to participate in an extension program with Bangarra. Congratulations to both Kimberley and Ella.

NAPLAN Changes

As parents will remember, 2023 has seen some significant changes with NAPLAN which commenced with the repositioning of NAPLAN to Term 1 from its previous position in the Term 2 calendar. Subsequently, results will be out far earlier with school level results being released to principals in late Term 2 and parent reports being available in Term 3. Additionally, each child's NAPLAN report will look distinctly different this time around so that instead of student performance being communicated along a progression scale of numbered bands, student results will now be placed against one of FOUR proficiency standards which are so much clearer and easier to understand. These proficiency standards are:

- Exceeding
- Strong
- Developing
- Needs additional support

Wellbeing Support at EHS

A reminder to all our families of the array of wellbeing services we offer at EHS. If your child needs to access these at any time, please let your child's Year Adviser know or seek their expert advice. Three of our most important programs and services are:

- School Wellbeing Staff our Wellbeing Team can support your child with a range of issues including social issues, anxiety, mental health and many additional areas. Our team includes experts such as School Counsellors, Student Support Officer, Supervisor of Girls and our Chaplain.
- Stymie our free and anonymous online support notification service in which students can alert the school about a bullying or other wellbeing matter for themselves or a friend. This service cannot be traced to the person who has made the report so it really helps teenagers feel that their worries are communicated privately.
- Thrive EHS runs explicit wellbeing lessons once a week for all students every Monday. This is a unique program devised by our staff specifically for the needs of our students. Stage 6 have a different program compared to Stages 4 and 5 and we are always increasing the array of topics we cover from evidenced based topics like positive psychology, self esteem , bullying, kindness and our Positive Behaviour Learning themes of Respect, Responsibility and Reflection.

Parental Concerns

From time to time in all schools, parents may be concerned about a specific issue. As always, we aim to build the strongest relationships with parents and the community that we can and we ask parents to contact us when you have a

question that may not have been addressed in other school communication forums. As school leaders, the school's executive staff are only too happy to return your call, identify what can be done to help and put measures into place to support you and your child. As school leaders, all our decisions are underpinned by Department of Education policies and required procedures. We thank our families for your support in this area and your confidence in the work we do every day to make our school the best place it can be.

FROM THE DEPUTY PRINCIPALS Natalie Martin (DP Years 9 & 12) TTFM Survey

All students in Years 7 to 12 will be asked to complete the Tell Them From Me Survey (TTFM). This survey is an evidence-based survey tool designed to gather feedback from students, parents, and teachers about their experiences and perceptions of education. The survey aims to provide valuable insights into various aspects of the school environment, teaching practices, student engagement, and overall school climate.

By gathering data through the TTFM survey, EHS can gain a better understanding of how students and parents perceive their experiences within the school community. The survey results can inform decision-making processes and help identify areas of improvement in teaching practices, student support programs, and school policies.

The TTFM survey is administered online, with participants accessing the survey through a secure platform. The survey questions are carefully crafted to capture feedback on various dimensions of education and are tailored to different age groups and roles (students, parents, teachers). The responses are collected anonymously to ensure confidentiality and encourage open and honest feedback.

All students have been emailed a link to the survey and an individual login and password. Teachers will allocate time in class for students to complete the survey before the end of Term 2.

Year 9

It was a pleasure to attend our school Athletics Carnival on 19th May. Participating in school athletics carnivals offers



several benefits for students. Some of the key advantages include improving physical fitness, developing new skills which can be beneficial for their overall athletic abilities. Students also had the opportunity to engage in teamwork and collaboration where they work together towards a common goal, support their teammates, and communicate effectively, thus developing important social skills.

It was also the first year of school houses where I witnessed an uplift in school spirit and community. Students and teachers dressed in their house colours and cheered and encouraged participants thereby improving school spirit and pride.

Year 12

On Friday 8th May, 60 students were participated in our first Elevate Day where we delivered a series of workshops designed to motivate students to improve their performance in the HSC. The workshops included the following themes: assessment reflection, using feedback, goal setting, acing the HSC exams, advice on HSC techniques for English and Mathematics, alumni experiences, and relaxation techniques.

Improving Higher School Certificate (HSC) performance requires a combination of effective study strategies, time management, and a healthy lifestyle. During the first workshop students were able to define their academic goals. Having a clear vision will helps students to stay focused and motivated throughout the year.

Ms Dokmanovic and Mr Sambuco were able to help students to understand the exam format advising them to become familiar with the exam pattern, syllabus, and marking scheme for each subject. Additional advice included prioritising topics, allocating time accordingly, and understanding how to approach different types of questions.

Students were also encouraged to form study groups where discussion of concepts, explaining ideas to others and solving problems collaboratively to enhance understanding and retention of information.

Mrs Bright and Mrs Mulligan provided advice on using effective study techniques and encouraged students to experiment with different study techniques such as active recall, summarizing information in your own words, creating mind maps, or using flashcards. Students should try to find the methods that work best for them and incorporate them into their study routine.

Miss Dennis invited two alumni James Craven and Blake Penfold to recount their experiences of the HSC and their pathways beyond the HSC. Then she led a relaxation activity with a focus on maintaining a healthy lifestyle by getting regular exercise, eating nutritious meals, and getting enough sleep. Physical activity and a balanced diet can boost energy levels and enhance cognitive function, while adequate sleep helps consolidate learning and improves memory.

The final message for the day was that HSC improvement requires consistent effort and dedication over a sustained

period of time. Thank you to the teachers who presented to students on the day.

National Sorry Day

Reconciliation Week

Reconciliation is about strengthening relationships between First Nations people and non-Indigenous people, for the benefit of all Australians. A reconciled Australia is one where the rights of First Nations people are not just respected but championed in all the places that matter.

This year everyone is asked to make change beginning with brave actions in their daily lives – where they live, work, play and socialise.

To commence Reconciliation Week students participated in a Thrive lesson. In this lesson, students were provided with information about the purpose of Reconciliation Week and National Sorry Day. The EHS Acknowledgment of Country was also launched as a step towards making change. This Acknowledgement of Country was developed by the student body including members of the SRC, Senior Leadership Team and First Nations students.
