PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

How Term 3 is flying! Life at EHS has been packed full of activities and celebrations over the past few weeks.

In Week 2, our Year 7 students ventured out to Camp Yarramundi for our annual Year 7 Camp. Students enjoyed their time solidifying new friendships and challenging themselves to tackle fears and participate in a range of activities. A massive thank you to Mrs Bright, our Year 7 Year Adviser and all our accompanying staff for organising this trip so that students could have memories to last a lifetime.

In Week 3, we celebrated Education Week. This year's theme was 175 Years of Public Education which gave us the opportunity to reflect on how far education has come since the first public schools commenced their operations in NSW. Elderslie High School welcomed parents for Recognition Assemblies within the junior school on 3-4 September which was a wonderful opportunity to celebrate the achievements of our students.

Week 4's standout event was our HSC CAPA Evening in which our Drama, Dance, Music and Visual Arts students performed their major works for the audience, in readiness for the upcoming HSC exams. The students may have been nervous, but they displayed great fortitude and bravery to share their works with us.

Week 5 was packed full of big-ticket items including our NAIDOC Week celebrations, the Drama Festival and Science Week. As many members of our community would know, NAIDOC week is actually celebrated annually in the school holidays which means that we need to find another special week in which to hold it. It was wonderful to have so many families visit the school on Tuesday, August 15 for our First Nations Garden opening and to have a yarn over afternoon tea. On the same day was the launch of the EHS Science Fair which aligns to National Science Week. It was certainly a privilege to attend the Fair and see such a lot of major Science Research Projects on display as well as some fascinating and attention-grabbing experiments from Mr Kairouz and Mrs Ferris. Their technical prowess with chemicals including liquid nitrogen certainly was a showstopper!

Finally, Week 5 included the "In The Spotlight" Drama Festival which is directed by our very own Ms Dennis. This regional display of performing arts talent from schools from far and wide was a pleasure to watch with our Year 11 Drama



students showcased, both for their dramatic performances and their reprise of Strictly Ballroom, the Musical.

HSC Supervisors Wanted

Are you looking for short term work and can spare a few weeks? NSW Education Standards Authority are looking for a few more supervisors for the HSC Exams this year. The following criteria apply:

- Must be over 18 years of age
- Cannot be a recent student who knows the current Year 12 year group
- Must have a valid Working With Children Check
- Cannot have a relative who is sitting the HSC this year
- Cannot have been recently employed by the school, either paid or volunteer
- Cannot be tutoring any students sitting for the HSC in 2023

Uniform

We would like to thank the vast majority of our students who are in full school uniform every day. As parents may remember, the school has introduced the opportunity to wear **any item of EHS uniform any day**, with the exception of Wednesdays when the junior school should all be in their sports uniform. We encourage students to wear their normal uniform on all other days of the week, unless they have a PE prac lesson. Despite this, we will accept sports uniforms throughout the week too, not just Wednesdays.

Our staff completely understand that many parents may have left for work in the morning before their children leave for school however, we ask that parents check their children have the correct items of uniform to wear. Occasionally, we are seeing non-uniform items such as alternate-colour hoodies and tracksuit pants creep in. This is followed up by our staff.

Elderslie High School is, of course, a fully uniformed school and wearing the uniform creates a cohesively appearing student body where belonging is promoted. We thank all our families for the support we receive related to this issue and remind all parents that if we can help in any way to overcome financial issues where uniform is concerned, we will always try to do so. If financial assistance is required, we ask parents to discreetly contact the school via email and this request will be supported. Finally, please ensure your child has safe leather shoes to wear on days when they may be doing practical lessons such as Science, Timber and Food Technology. For sport, we ask students to wear a supportive jogger or runner that students can perform sport in, not flat based shoes such as converse which are not appropriate for doing sport in as these shoes do not support the foot when running, jumping etc.

Berry Street Educational Model

The staff at Elderslie High are currently undertaking professional learning of the Berry Street Educational Model (BSEM). BSEM is based on proven positive education, traumainformed and wellbeing practices that focuses on students' self-regulation, relationships, and wellbeing to increase engagement and improve academic achievement. As a school we have introduced these strategies into our classrooms by aligning them to our existing Elderslie Lesson Framework. From Monday Week 5 Term 3, all Year 7 classes have been using the following strategies:

Entrance and Exit Routines – these are the non-negotiable predictable procedures used to ensure that students are beginning and ending each lesson in a calm and consistent manner.

Ready to Learn Scale – this provides an opportunity for students to show their readiness to learn and communicate it to their teacher as they enter the classroom.

Circle Time – is a daily routine occurring at the start of Period 1 that includes an opportunity to greet classmates, establish learning expectations, complete a positive primer to promote engagement and focus on creating a positive classroom culture.

Brain breaks – are short breaks designed to help students stay focused and attentive. Brain breaks involve some type of movement that helps with blood circulation. Brain breaks assist with retaining information and staying focused.

We look forward to seeing how our Year 7 students respond to these strategies.

Year 9

Year 9 students have an assessment period coming up this term. Parents can support their children by checking in with which subjects they are undertaking and asking your child if they have received a copy of each of their assessment tasks. Children also find it helpful to go over the task requirements and marking criteria before commencing the task and again upon completion to check that all parts have been completed.

I have had some enquiries about the school leaving age from some parents whose children are interested in pursuing a trade. Legislation in NSW indicates that all students must complete Year 10 and remain at school until they are 17 years old. After Year 10 and until the age of 17 students can leave school if they are in approved education or training, in full time employment, in registered home schooling or a combination of these three. Students can leave school at the beginning of Year 10 if they are in approved education or training such as a full-time apprenticeship. The school requires a copy of the approved Australian Apprenticeship Contract and Training Plan before completing an exemption from enrolment form. Before considering leaving school students should undertake some work experience which can be arranged through the school's Careers Adviser.

Year 12

Year 12 successfully completed their Trial HSC Examinations at the end of last term, and they are now completing their final assessment tasks before commencing the HSC Examinations. If any students were unable to attend school on the day of an assessment, they are required to hand in a completed "Illness or Misadventure" form on the first day of their return to school. Students are also required to provide medical documentation and, in most cases, complete the outstanding assessment task. If a child is unable to attend an HSC Examination, they are required to fill in a NESA Misadventure form which can be collected from Ms Martin or the Presiding Officer, Mrs Kelly. HSC Examinations are not rescheduled so it is essential to obtain a medical certificate on the day for all cases of illness during the examination period.

It is an exciting time for Year 12 as there will be a Graduation Ceremony, Picnic Day, Trivia Night, Mufti Days, staff verses student games and their Farewell Assembly in the second half of this term. It is important for students to remain focused on learning and behave respectfully so they can participate in and make the most of every opportunity provided to them by the school.

Wellbeing at EHS National Day of Action Against Bullying and Violence

On Monday the 7th of August, students and staff at Elderslie High School acknowledged the National Day of Action Against Bullying and Violence. On this day each year group viewed an interactive presentation from Bully Zero during their timetabled lessons. The presentation for our students in Years 7 - 9, was focussed on cyber-safety and cyberbullying and resilience for students in Years 10, 11 and 12. These presentations were well received by students and provided useful strategies to empower our students to act safely and responsibly when interacting with others at school and in the wider real and digital world. In addition to these virtual presentations, our students in Years 7 and 8 were engaged in a workshop in the school hall which involved acrobatics and games to deliver messages about the impacts of bullying. It was pleasing to see so many students volunteer to participate in the presentation activities and share their experiences and strategies to respond to bullying safely.



Thanks to the Year 11 Prefect Team, Learning Support and Social and Emotional Learning Teams, students participated in superhero themed activities during breaks. These activities included the Hawk Eye Throw, Flash Sprint Race, Professor X Jellybean Guessing Competition and Spiderman Highest Jump. Winners were awarded with a ticket to a movie last Friday afternoon, including snacks and a ticket for a friend. All participants received an orange lolly pop, as well as students who attended school in a splash of orange to represent the occasion. The purpose of these activities was to encourage positive connections between our students, student leaders and staff as these relationships facilitate students to access support more easily when required.

Student feedback collected indicated the message of the day had been received – which was being kind towards one another and to report incidents of bullying by being an upstander.

Finally, I would like to take this opportunity to remind our families of our Stymie platform. This platform can be accessed by students and families to alert staff of occurrences of bullying or other issues. The Wellbeing Team use this platform to gather data to determine future initiatives to reach a wider audience and to provide targeted wellbeing support to students who require it.

As a school community, we look forward to continuing to collaborate with our students to plan valuable learning opportunities for our students.

In addition to place winners, several students received honourable mention through the People's Choice Awards.



Science Trail for Science Week

An exciting day of science and STEM was had by some of our Year 9 students who participated in the Sydney Science Trail as part of National Science Week.

At the Australian Museum the students attended a science Expo filled with interactive stalls that provided excitement, intrigue, and insight into possible science career paths. Students were able to have a look around some of the museum exhibitions which included Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander technologies and cultural materials, animal specimens that included an elephant, a rhinoceros, a giraffe, a lion, a tiger and a bear. Students were blown away at the size of the Sperm Whale skeleton, before looking at the 200 Treasures of the museum, along with the dinosaur skeletons and models.

The students then participated in a forensic workshop where they were able to simulate solving a crime by extracting strawberry DNA. Mrs Ferris was very impressed by their laboratory techniques and ability to match up gene sequences.


