PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

Welcome to the start of the 2024 school year! It is wonderful to see all of our returning students and particularly exciting to meet all of our new Year 7 students and their families.

At this time of the year, it's a good idea to remember that the school works in partnership with each of our families to promote the development of your children. We do so much more than support the learning of students - we are also keen to support you to guide students in all aspects of their lives including social, emotional and psychological. Obviously the role of the family is at the forefront but we do encourage you to reach out to us if there is anything we can do to help in these areas of adolescent development. We will always do our best to access the services at our disposal. We ask that you get in touch as early as you can if there is an emerging problem or something you're worried about. If we know about it early, we have every chance of being able to intervene with the greatest success. As a principal, I also ask that if you are unsure about a school practice or decision, that you contact us at the school, either by phone or email and ask us directly. This will ensure that you get the correct answer which we hope will clarify matters for you.

Communication Channels

- Social concerns your child's Year Adviser.
- Learning Support issues Head Teacher Welfare or one of our Learning & Support Teachers.
- Significant academic issues or disciplinary issues Deputy Principal for your child's year group.

Please note however, that our teaching staff are on class for a large proportion of the day so if you contact us and the person you wish to speak to is not available, they will indeed endeavour to contact you as soon as they are able.

School Contributions and Student assistance

School Campus Improvements

As most parents would know, EHS was built in 1976 and as such, we are always looking for ways to improve the campus for students. I am delighted to say that the second stage of "The Grove" part of the playground is now complete. This renovation extends on stage one of The Grove and provides more seating, covered tables, and shade for our students. We have added more trees which will, over time, add even more protection in the hotter months. The ground cover has been completed with more astro-turf which makes a nice place for our students to sit with friends in breaks, a little bit like a picnic.

We have also changed our bell system so that we now have a PA system that allows for music to be played and announcements to be made much more effectively across the entire campus. Finally, we have added a new outdoor classroom to the back of the school behind the Science labs.

Behaviour at School

From the start of Term 1, the Department has launched a new Behaviour Code for students as well as substantially overhauled procedures for suspension and expulsion. Parents and students will notice a change in the expectations of all schools aligned to high standards. Our school is a place where all students should be given the opportunity to learn.

FROM THE DEPUTY PRINCIPALS Natalie Martin (DP Years 7 & 10)

Year 7

Year 7 have settled into Year 7 and have started to familiarise themselves with the school campus and their teachers. Most students have been engaged in learning and made new friends in each of their classes. Our Tech Elect class has space to include more girls, so if your child is interested in learning through communication, collaboration, critical thinking and creativity using ipads please contact the school. It is not too late to join this innovative class.

Year 7 students will be sitting the NAPLAN tests between 6th and 18th March. More information will be emailed to parents closer to the date. Students will need to bring their own wired earphones for NAPLAN.

Year 10

All students in Year 10 have a Careers lesson one period per fortnight. These lessons aim to support students in their transition from Year 10 to post school pathways or to the HSC

and beyond. Every student will complete a transition plan so the school can work with your child to successfully support them to transition to their chosen pathway.

Year 10 and their parents were issued with a note explaining that the Formal is an invitational event held by the school requiring all students to follow the school code of conduct throughout the year to ensure their attendance at this prestigious event.

All students have also attended a presentation about our school Assessment Policy. They signed for a copy of the Assessment Guidelines which outlines the Department of Education requirements for assessment and the Record of School Achievement. All assessment guidelines are available on the school website.

ELEVATE Program

ELEVATE is being offered to identified and interested students in Year 12 to enable them to achieve their potential. Many students need to be better prepared to tackle the added expectations and requirements of the HSC courses of study and they are often overwhelmed by the workload. The first ELEVATE Day is being held in the school library on Thursday 15th February.

It is important that students realise the value of their Stage 6 course of study before it is too late. Lack of information or preparation can affect their motivation, application and attendance, which ultimately affects their performance and grades. With a few simple routines and a well organised, planned and motivated approach towards study, assessment and examinations, most students can reach higher levels of achievement in the HSC, as well as maintain improved mental health and reduced stress levels.

We have identified students who would benefit from participating in this program and to encourage attendance the school will provide morning tea and lunch. Interested students can speak to Miss Malcolm to be included in this event. An email was sent to students who were invited to participate in this event.

Year 8 are now into their second year of high school and should be more settled and we trust they will take up all the opportunities offered to them at EHS. Later this year they will get the opportunity to choose their first elective subjects which will commence in Year 9.

For Year 11, we will be working with our students throughout the year as their set goals and make decisions about senior school and pursuing opportunities post-school. In the coming weeks, there will be presentations for Year 11 in regards to senior high school, their requirements and working towards their HSC. Students are reminded of the importance of following school policy around attendance and completion of assessment tasks including illness, extensions and misadventure procedures. If any student is absent from the presentation, they will need to see their relevant Deputy Principal to collect and sign for the documentation that was issued. A copy of all the assessment guidelines will also be available on the school's website.

The start of the new school year is the perfect time to establish good routines of a morning to ensure that students arrive to school on time. It is very important that students attend roll call on time to have their name marked off and to hear the Daily Notices. This gives them time to settle in and be aware of any variations to their day, as well as hear of events that may be of interest to them. All students are expected to be at school prior to the bell at 8:50am Students should only be absent from school if there is a valid reason and this needs to be communicated to the school. The easiest way to do this is by responding to the automated text message. If students arrive late to school, they must report directly to the student office to receive a late note that they then present to the class teacher.

Administration Hints & Tips

Please refer to your child's Student Diary for the correct procedure for the following. Our school diaries are a great resource for our students with important information, bell times, staff directory etc. By following these procedures, it ensures the smooth running of our school.

If student is late for school- A note is to be provided by the parent explaining reason. Student to report to Student Office with note to obtain a late slip before class.

If student is leaving early- A note to be provided by parent/carer explaining the reason and time student is to be collected. Student will need to have their note approved by the Deputy Principal or the Sports Co-ordinator on a Wednesday. This needs to be done BEFORE Roll Call in the morning. Permission over the phone for your child to leave early will not be accepted.

Sick Bay- If a student is sick, they should advise their teacher and come to the Student Office where staff will contact their parents should they need to go home. The person collecting the student must be an emergency contact on our system.

Payments- Payments can be made online, with access from the school website.

Student Absences- Advise the school, provide a note and/or medical certificate on return.

Vaccinations

From 2024, parents can provide consent online for their child's routine school vaccinations.

The following vaccines are offered free to students at school:

- in Year 7 diphtheria-tetanus-pertussis (dTpa) and human papillomavirus (HPV)
- in Year 10 meningococcal ACWY vaccine

Vaccination will only be provided at school if consent has been received. To provide consent for vaccination online, parents/carers will need:

- their Service NSW log-in details, or to create an account with Service NSW if they don't already have one
- Medicare details for parents/carers and their child

Benefits of online consent for parents/carers:

- SMS notifications when vaccinations are given
- easy updating of their child's details online
- faster upload of their child's vaccination records to the Australian Immunisation Register (AIR)

For those who do not have access to online consent:

 Printed consent materials are also available and can be distributed to students where parents/carers cannot provide online consent, including for parents/carers or students who do not have a Medicare card or internet access. These can be collected from the Learning Support Faculty.

Anti-Racism Contact Officer

In line with NSW DoE policy, all forms of racism are unacceptable at Elderslie High School. No student, employee, parent, caregiver or community member should experience racism, including direct or indirect harassment within the learning and working environments of the department.

A member of staff in all public schools must undergo training to become the school's ARCO (Anti-Racism Contact Officer). In addition, all teaching staff undertake training to increase their understanding of the nature and impact of racism and their responsibility to support the Anti-Racism Policy. The ARCO at Elderslie High is Ms Woo, who is in her fifth year in this role.

The ARCO's role has four main aspects as follows: mediator role, procedural role, educational role and monitoring role. Most importantly, Elderslie High School staff will continue to promote acceptance of and respect for Australia's cultural, linguistic and religious diversity. Anti-racism education is taught in our classrooms directly and indirectly and we make every effort to ensure our school is free from discrimination.

As the Anti-Racism Contact Officer we can support staff, students, and any member of the school community who wishes to raise a complaint of racism or just talk about their experiences of racism as a target or bystander. Students will find Ms Woo in the Science staffroom or can alert any staff member to racist matters.

National Apology Day

National Apology Day in Australia is observed on February 13th every year. It is a national day commemorating the first-ever national apology made by Prime Minister Kevin Rudd in 2008 to initialise the Australian federal government's rehabilitation, justice, and reconciliation agenda for the First Nations people, and the tens of thousands of children who were forcibly removed from their families during Australia's assimilation era.

National Apology Day provides an opportunity to seek healing and pursue reconciliation in Australia. It emphasises the need to close the gap of discrimination, unjust treatment, racism, and abuse of human rights in Australia towards First Nations citizens, families, and communities.

First Nations Roll Call

Our First Nations cultural roll call will continue in 2024. This roll call focuses on cultural activities and supports First Nations Students with classwork and assessment tasks. Those students already attending this roll call will continue to attend. However, those students wishing to join in Years 8-12 will need to see Ms Crossingham in the PE staffroom for a permission note.

Students in Year 7 will be welcomed to the school with a yarn and some morning tea. All Year 7 students will receive a note to join at this morning tea. This note needs to be returned to Ms Crossingham in the PDHPE Staffroom or Ms Wallace in the Learning Support Staffroom if they wish to join.

GO Foundation Scholarship

The Go Foundation Scholarships are an excellent opportunity for First Nations Students to support their journey through high school. Students can apply in Year 8 and Year 10. We are so proud of how hard all our Year 12 students worked and personally, I am very proud of the commitment and effort of the whole faculty in supporting our students. This has set a new benchmark for the faculty, and we are excited to take through the next cohort of Year 12 who we know can reach these lofty heights. Through hard work and dedication, they too can achieve top marks.

This positive news sets a tone for all our students in 2024 and as a faculty we will be reinforcing to all students the importance on engaging with their classwork here at school and the value of completing homework on a regular basis. Those students who achieved strong results all worked very hard right from their junior years, so we hope to help inspire our future top performers. I encourage all parents and carers to regularly engage in discussion with their child about their progress at school and remind those in junior years to complete their Mathletics tasks for homework. Senior students are encouraged to constantly revise and practice past papers where possible. The Mathematics faculty are looking forward to another successful year ahead.

Agriculture News

We are looking forward to a very exciting 2024 on the school farm with lots of activities already planned for Term 1.

We currently have eggs in the incubator, that will be hatching at the beginning of Week 4, ready for our Year 7 Chicken Care Unit. Small groups of students will be allocated a chick to care for and monitor at school throughout Term 1. This is always a popular activity with the students as they learn how to care for a young animal. Some of these layer chicks will be available for sale at the end of the term. Year 7 students will also begin setting up their vegetable gardens this semester and will start by producing lettuce and tomatoes.

Show preparations began last year with the breeding of some new pure breed poultry to boost our team for both Camden Show and Sydney Royal. Students will be monitoring the food consumption and egg production for our "Layer Team" so they can complete the project component of the Layer Competition at Sydney Royal. As well as presenting 26 of our birds for judging, 8 of our students will also be judged on their chicken expertise in the Poultry Youth Showmanship competition where they will be assessed on their knowledge of their selected breed and their handling skills. Some of our older students will also be competing in the Poultry Young Judges Competition.

In January, 4 of our students attended an Alpaca Camp run by the Australian Alpaca Association where they further developed their knowledge and skills in working with and showing alpacas. We are looking forward to these students passing on some of their expertise to others at school who wish to become involved in showing our alpacas. The Alpaca Team will be showing alpacas at both Camden Show and Sydney Royal. We have our own alpacas but supplement the team with some show animals provided by our mentor stud, Storybook Alpacas. The Alpaca Team and the animals go through an intensive training period ready to compete in both the Paraders and Stockmanship competitions at Camden Show and Sydney Royal Easter Show.

Members of the Cattle Show Team will be competing in the Young Judges Competition at Castle Hill Show in March. Our own cattle will be arriving at school early in Term 2.

As well as presenting livestock at Camden Show, we will have our display about Soil in the High Schools' Agriculture Tent. A large number of students will be working on this display throughout the show, answering questions and helping children with related craft activities. Please come and say hello if you are at the show.

Library Matters

Welcome back, everyone! I look forward to working with you all as we move into 2024. Our school library is a wonderful place full of great resources to help you find success at Elderslie High. We're open every morning tea and lunch for students to:

- Complete and print assessments
- Use, borrow and return resources such as books, magazines, games, and laptops.
- Relax in comfort with your friends or make some new ones.
- Access the Technology Support Officer and the Wellbeing/Learning Support Faculty
- Take part in our social events, such as the Dungeons and Dragons Club

At Elderslie High School we also have an online library. If you'd like to browse the thousands of free eBooks and Audiobooks we have waiting to be borrowed, you can login using your school email at https://eldersliehs.eplatform.co/.

This year I greatly look forward to working with the Year 7 and 8 students in the Wide Reading Program. During these fortnightly lessons we give students access to high interest, self-selected texts and allow students time to explore, share, and value their reading in a socially supported positive learning environment. Through this program we aimed to create independent, lifelong readers who are set up for personal and academic success.

Recent research from the Australia Reads organisation reveals:

 Reading is four times more influential on intellectual progress in teens than having a parent with a degree.




- The top barriers to teens reading were the difficulty of choosing a good book (61%), followed by lack of free time (56%).
- Exposure to larger home libraries in adolescence has a positive direct effect on adult literacy, numeracy, and information and communications technology skills.
- 68% of young people said that BookTok had inspired them to read a book that they would have never considered otherwise.
- A 20% reduction in mortality was observed for those who read books (30 mins a day), compared to those who did not read books.
- Adults who read books, magazines, and newspapers almost every day had a substantially lower risk of being diagnosed with depression.
 They also scored lower on the loneliness scale.
- 43% of readers said reading helps them get a better night's sleep.
- 95% of people who are blind or partially sighted read at least once a week to alleviate feelings of loneliness and isolation.
- Reading for just 30 minutes a week means you're 57% more likely to have a greater awareness of other cultures.

Simple actions like talking about what you're reading or reading with your child can therefore have a significant positive impact on their academic success and personal wellbeing.

Share special time with a book 86% of children said they loved being read books aloud at home or liked it a lot – the main reason being because it is a special time with parents.

Bond at bedtime with a book Three in four (74%) Australian parents believe that reading to their child provides them with an important bonding experience and helps them to connect.



Education

Behaviour code for students

NSW public schools are committed to providing safe, supportive, and responsive learning environments for everyone across a range of settings. We teach and model the inclusive and safe behaviours we value in our students.

- resolve conflict respectfully, calmly and fairly
- · meet the school's agreed uniform policy or dress code
- attend school every day (unless legally excused)
- respect all property
- be safe and not be violent or bring weapons, illegal drugs, alcohol, vapes, e-cigarettes or tobacco into our schools
- not bully, harass, intimidate, or discriminate against anyone in our schools.

Schools take action in response to behaviour that is detrimental to self or others or to the achievement of high-quality teaching and learning

All students have a right to:

- · safety at school
- access and fully participate in their learning
- · be treated with respect by other students, teachers and school staff
- · express their views, set goals and self-advocate.

The principal and school staff, using their professional judgment, are best placed to maintain discipline and provide safe, supportive and responsive learning environments and apply an appropriate action when students are not meeting these expectations. The department is responsible for the provision of a policy framework and resources such as legal issues bulletins, access to specialist advice, and professional learning to guide principals and their staff in exercising their professional judgment. In this context, the NSW Government and the Department of Education will back the authority and judgment of principals and school staff at the local level.





Behaviour code for students: Student actions

Promoting the inclusion, learning, wellbeing, and safety of all students in NSW public schools is a high priority for the Department of Education.

We implement teaching and learning approaches across a range of settings to support the development of skills needed by students to meet our high standards for respectful, safe and engaged behaviour.

To meet the expectations set out above, students in NSW public schools, to the best of their ability, should adhere to the following principles.

- Be aware of and take responsibility for how their behaviour and actions impact others.
- · Care for self and others.
- Be safe and help others to make safe choices that do not hurt themselves or others.

Engagement

- · Arrive at school and class on time.
- Be prepared for every lesson.
- Actively participate in learning.
- Aspire and strive to achieve the highest standards of learning.
